No other security is so fully protected by law. New issues must be separately authorized by special act of the Legislature, which thus exercises supervision over all borrowing measures, and permits only issues as are necessary and within the limits of the municipality's resources.

Each debenture bears the endorsement of the Commissioner of Municipal Affairs, and is a legal tender for the payment of the debt it represents.
