TRY TO ORGANIZE HUGE
HOSTILE DEMONSTRATION

PARIS, March 7.—The Social Revolution-
ists, as a protest against the vigorous
measures of the government, tried
to organize a huge hostile demonstra-
tion against Premier Clemenceau today
at the unveiling of the monument
erected to Charles Thomas Piquet,
former prime minister of France.
President Fallieres, ex-President
Loubet, many officials, senators and
deputies were present, with the mem-
bers of various organizations. At the
first sign of unruly manifestations a
large force of police which had been
placed on duty took immediate steps
to suppress the demonstrators, a num-
ber of whom were arrested.

PROF. PRINCE TALKS
ABOUT LOBSTER FISHING

Some Interesting Information to New
Committee on Marine and
Fisheries.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 8.—The new
committee on Marine and Fisheries got
down to work today when Professor
Prince of the Dominion Fisheries com-
missioner submitted some interesting in-
formation relating to lobster fisheries.
So far as value was concerned he said
lobster fisheries ranked second in Can-
ada, salmon being first with a value of
five million dollars, while lobsters
were valued at over four million dol-
lars. After tracing the life history of
lobster, Professor Prince offered a few
practical considerations drawn from his
study and experience of lobster fishery.
He was of opinion that in-shore breed-
ing ponds where lobsters might hatch
out their eggs were not likely to be
successful. The lobsters must be
largely caught in breeding season and
was very desirable that small lobsters
should be returned to waters and not
taken to shore. Replying to A. K.
MacLean, Professor Prince said the
fisheries department at Ottawa had
done no re effective work than any
other similar department in the world.
Among the questions regarding which
there was a good deal of diversity of
opinion in the Maritime Provinces was
as to the best months in the year for
a close season, whether lobster hatch-
eries would be better the preserving
female lobsters; whether a short open
season without other restrictions; can-
ning lobsters; lobster ponds; the ship-
ping of lobsters and exportations of lobsters
in large quantities to United States.
Professor Prince expressed the opinion
that the fisheries industry had grown
so much that it was essential that
there should be an administrative head
for the fisheries department alone.
There were between 700 and 800 can-
neries in the Maritime Provinces. He
saw no reason why live lobsters should
not be shipped to Europe where better
prices would be brought, rather than
to the United States.

USUAL POMP WILL BE
MISSED AT MONTREAL

Factional Jealousy Prevents Immense Anna
St. Patrick's Day Parade.

MONTREAL, Mar. 8.—St. Patrick's
Day will not be celebrated here with
the usual pomp. In the past years all
the parades of the city united in one
procession which ran up into ten of
thousands. This year there will be half
a dozen separate processions. The
fight started a couple of years ago
when Father McNamee was appointed
to St. Patrick's parish. He was opposed
by the other parishes. The other
parishes have refused to recognize
him as the head of the March 17
celebration.

POLICE INVESTIGATE
STORY OF FATAL HOLD-UP

CHICAGO, Ill., March 8.—Hugh Hop-
kins, 37 years old, son of J. J. Hop-
kins, superintendent of stations of the
South Side Elevated R., was found
dead early this morning in a doorway
at 730 Westworth Avenue, after John
Latona, a bar-tender, had reported to
the police by telephone that he had
been shot with a hold-up man in a
South Side saloon. Latona is de-
tained by the authorities pending in-
vestigation of his story. He says that
Hopkins pounded on the door of the
saloon after closing hours and when
the door was opened drew a revolver
and fired. Latona returned the fire and
Hopkins died. His body was found
a block from the scene of the shooting.

LONDON, March 8.—The British de-

PRINCIPAL DUTY
OF A NEWSPAPER

It is to Criticize, Says
Judge Gaynor

Judge Principal Speaker at
Laying of Corner Stone
of New Club

NEW YORK, March 8.—Justice Wil-
liam J. Gaynor of the New York su-
preme court was the principal speak-
er at the laying of the corner stone
of the New York Press Club's new
building here today. He spoke of the
freedom of the press, urging the right
of the newspaper to criticize full and
freely those in public office. He said
in part:

"To exercise this privilege of criticism
is not only the right of the news-
papers, but the chief duty. This is
the country's highest safeguard
against corruption and wrongdoing."
By criticism, of course, I do not
mean abuse. To be abusive, rough, or
unfair, is justly regarded by all good
newspaper men as unethical and im-
proper.

"One of a modern newspaper's great-
est services should be the showing up
of the demagogue and the loose
preacher of evil, whose promiscuous
denunciation of all successful busi-
ness interests has done much to handi-
cap the country."

"Journalism has come to be one of
the five learned professions, ranking in
dignity and power for good with the
law, medicine, the ministry, and
for the fisheries department alone."

The corner stone of the new build-
ing was laid by the Grand Lodge
Masons of the state of New York.
The club was founded in 1888, and is
the oldest organization of its kind in
America. It has a very complete
reference library presented by Andrew
Carnegie, which includes the bound
volumes of the New York newspapers for
fifty years back.

UNIVERSITY OF MAINE
IS IN GRAVE DANGER

BOSTON, March 8.—The University
of Maine is in grave peril and the
loyal support of alumni is demand-
ed, according to Professor Stevens
of the university, who appeared
before the Alumni Association of Bos-
ton tonight in place of President Pe-
lows, who was unable to be present.
Prof. Stevens was the opening speak-
er at the banquet which was given at
the Parker House. He said in part:
"We have learned by a recent de-
cision of the supreme court of the
University of Maine is not a state in-
stitution but a private corporation.
There is also a private corporation
which appropriates money to the uni-
versity; that no additional
courses of study shall be offered
and that students from outside the state
shall be charged \$100 tuition. It means
that we must fight the old battle all
over again."

Acting President A. A. Noyes of the
Massachusetts Institute of Technology
who was given the honorary degree
of D.L.D. by the University of Maine
last year, addressed the alumni and
said a more hopeful view of the situa-
tion and believed the court decision
rested on a mere technicality. He
thought legislative action of late
return time if they took measures to
hinder the university. He declared it
would be a poor feat for the state
to support a university which was
in his college in his loyalty.

NOTORIOUS CROOK
ADMITS IDENTITY

BALTIMORE, Md., Mar. 8.—George
Wheeler, alias George (Dutch) Brad-
ford, arrested last Wednesday and al-
leged to be one of the most notorious
criminals in America, confessed his
guilt today to Police Lieutenant
Casey. He was taken into custody on
the street last Wednesday with two
other men on the charge of pocket-
stealing.

His record shows he has served
terms in various prisons, including the
Western Penitentiary at Pittsburgh,
and that he shot and killed John
Rodgers in a quarrel over the division
of spoils at Memphis in 1903. For
this crime he was sentenced to life
imprisonment, but friends obtained
his pardon.

FINDS HIMSELF
STILL AN ALIEN

KINGSTON, N. Y., Mar. 8.—After
enjoying the privileges of American
citizenship more than eighteen years,
Anthony Thiel, of Kingston, a native
of Germany, found himself today
again an alien. He was born in 1869,
came to America when twenty years
of age, and two years later was ad-
mitted to citizenship in the Ulster
County supreme court, since which
time he has voted regularly at elec-
tions. That court had no right to
grant citizenship went through by mis-
take. Assistant United States District
Attorney Hugh Givern recently un-
earthed the facts and Thiel consented
to an order cancelling his illegal
papers. He will make immediate ap-
plication for citizenship at the proper
court.

STENOGRAPHER WAS
FORGER'S PARTNER

Miss Hallen is Accused of
Second Degree For-
gery

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 8.—State-
ments made to the police today by
Miss Hildgarde Hallen, stenographer
for M. Dwight Fortner, who disap-
peared February 13 before he was ac-
cused of a \$12,000 check forgery, have
led the authorities to believe that
Fortner made his employee an unwill-
ing party to a number of forgeries of
dead of trust. Miss Hallen was ac-
cused of second degree forgery in an
information issued by Assistant Pro-
secuting Attorney Falkenhelm to-
day. She was arrested while in bed at
her home.

According to the police six dupli-
cates were made of a deed of trust on prop-
erty at Clayton, Mo. Fortner is said
to have charged him with having forged
the signature of Henry C. Tulley as
an indorsement on a check for \$12,000
given by A. A. Steer in an uncom-
pleted real estate transaction in which
Fortner was acting as a broker. The
check was cashed by the St. Louis
Union Trust Company.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Mar. 8.—Mrs.
Ethel Martha Clary, said to be
wealthy and prominent in social circles
here, was arrested today as she was
about to sail for Europe on the Atlan-
tic transport, line steamer Minnehaha
on complaint of William Stuart, an
actor, who charges her with alienation
of his wife's affections.

In the affidavit accompanying the
complaint, Mr. Stuart, who demands
damages of \$50,000, alleged that his
wife was being taken to Europe by
Mrs. Clary against his consent.

A number of letters, which Mrs.
Stuart declares were written by Mrs.
Clary to his wife, form part of the
evidence submitted.

Mrs. Clary, who protested indignantly
at being taken from aboard the
steamer, was released upon furnishing
a \$2,000 cash bail, but too late to con-
tinue her intended voyage.

that his wife, Anna Holliger Stuart,

WOULDN'T TELL EVEN
IF HE KNEW, HE SAYS

Annual Guess as to Whether
There Will be Coal
Strike or Not

HAZLETON, Pa., Mar. 8.—Asked
whether he believed there would be a
strike in the anthracite coal fields,
President Lewis of the Mine Workers,
just before leaving for the West, said:
"Even if I knew I could not tell you."
He added that he believed he knew
what was going to happen but would
not tell.

A meeting of the district executive
board was held here this afternoon. It
is reported that operators are willing
to make some concessions if the miners
sign a long term agreement.

PROPOSAL AROUSES
GERMAN SUSPICION

Sending of American Com-
mission to Liberia Doesn't
Appeal to Germans

BERLIN, March 8.—The proposal
to send a commission to Liberia to in-
vestigate and report on conditions there
has aroused suspicion in some German
trading circles as to whether the United
States does not mediate the ultimate
annexation of this republic after first
assuming a protectorate over it.
The Rhenish Westphalian Gazette,
which represents manufacturing and
commercial interests, goes at length
into the subject. It alludes to what it
calls the American policy of "peace
and war" and warns the German govern-
ment to be watchful. The foreign office
has been informed of the conditions
and has decided to send this commission.

AMNESTY BILL IS
SIGNED BY GOMEZ

Provides for the Release of
Many Professional
Criminals

HAVANA, Mar. 8.—The general am-
nesty bill was signed today by Presi-
dent Gomez. It will take effect im-
mediately and provides for the release
from prison of those who have been
convicted of crimes other than crimes
of grave atrocity. This will result in the
freedom of many professional criminals,
which caused much uneasiness in
Havana. The police force in this city
has become largely disorganized by
reason of the discharge on Thursday
of three captains, of four more cap-
tains today as well as many experi-
enced detectives, to make room, it is
stated, for a number of political work-
ers.

ANOTHER ARREST
FOR PERJURY NOW

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 7.—It is
not improbable that before the argu-
ments begin tomorrow in the trial of
Colonel Duncan B. Cooper, Robin
Cooper and John D. Sharpe for the
murder of former Senator E. W. Car-
mack, another arrest for perjury will
be made on authority of Attorney Gen-
eral McCann. This time the accused
will be a man of prominence, whose
testimony was flatly contradicted by
half a dozen persons of unimpeachable
character.
