DIOCESAN SYNOD.

Annual Meeting Opened at Fredericton.

Reports Show All Churches Prosper-Ing-Will Invite Archbishop of Canterbury to St. John.

FREDERICTON, July 5. - The Church of England Synod opened here this morning in annual session at the Church Hall. His Lordship Bishop Kingdon presided, and the attendance was large, especially of the clergy.
After prayers and roll call His Lordthip appointed the following as a nom inating committee: Archdeacon Neales, Rev. Messrs. Freeborn, Dibblee, S. Neales, Smithers, Millidge and Dewdney, and Messrs. Burchill, Armstrong, more, Hewson, Grimmer, Sharpe and Raymond.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

His Lordship then delivered his aniual address to his clergy and diocese He referred in his opening remarks to the departure of Rev. H. A. Cody and his good work in the new field he has

In 1908 there is to be a grand meeting of the Anglican Communion in St. Paul's, London, for the purpose of discussing and solidifying the faith throughout the world, and the Bishop nominated a committee to carry or correspondence with London.

The Cathedral had been repaired, all expenses are paid and the edifice is now in a good state. His Lordship next dealt with the investment and sale of glebe and church

moneys and lands, and emphasized the fact that no corporation could act without the consent of the Bishop, and any corporation acting otherwise could be proceeded against for breach of trust. The law on the question was discussed and pointed out at some length, and examples were given where the Bishop could not sanction certain investments.

The provincial government was complimented in making mental arithmetic part of the educational system of our schools, and in this the province had followed the good example set by our secular schools.

His Lordship spoke of the Madras schools and the one especially in Fredericton, and urged strongly the building of a much better school in this city, and one in every way first class and of high standard.
