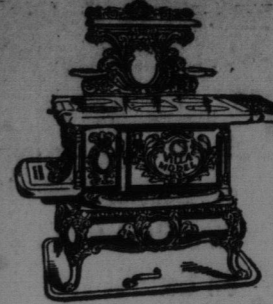

Cameron Cops St. Peters and A. O. H. Winners

Local Man Shewed Well for Three Miles in Saturday Night's Race But Could Not Pass Winner.

Fred Cameron demonstrated his superiority over Sterling when he defeated the local man in the Victoria rink by a little over a quarter of a lap. The time made was 26:43, which is almost 1 1/2 seconds slower than the distance was covered in last Tuesday's event.

A small crowd was in attendance as a great many expected that Cameron would win. The race was close until the beginning of the third mile, but men running almost neck and neck, Sterling being slightly in the rear. Cameron appeared to be getting quick and acting under the suggestion of his trainer and the urging of the crowd, Sterling attempted to take the lead. Then the Amherst boy showed some of the reserve speed which won for him the Boston Marathon, and with a wonderful sprint left Sterling almost a third of a lap in the rear. He maintained the lead until the finish although Sterling sprinted gamely on the last lap. The race was advertised to start at 9 o'clock, but it was nearly half past when the men appeared on the track. At the crack of the pistol the men started off in a dash each apparently intent upon taking the lead. After sprinting half a lap, Sterling dropped behind, but dogged closely Cameron's heels. They slowed down to a steady clip, and by the time the Amherst man opened out at different stages, he was unable to shake Sterling who appeared to the spectators to have the race well in hand. After the third mile had been covered in 16:02, Cameron appeared to be slowing down, and Sterling attempted to take the lead. Like a flash the champion sprinted ahead, and when he again slowed down he was almost half a lap ahead. Apparently satisfied with the lead, he again struck a steady clip and crossed the tape almost a third of a lap ahead of Sterling. His time was 26:43. Sterling's time was about 2 seconds slower. After the race Cameron said that he was feeling fine. He intends going home today where he will take a rest. He expects to enter the Canadian championship this summer. Yesterday he spent one of the St. John river admiring the beauties of the Rhine of America.

The Fredericton Gleaner says of Cameron: Two Nova Scotia commercial men who were in town yesterday were discussing Marathon races and long distance running at the Victoria House. Both agreed that Fred Cameron, of Amherst, the winner of the Boston Marathon, was the champion runner of the world, and that they take the word, and barring accidents of course.

"But," said one of the Cameron backers, "Fred told me that he has a young brother about 15 years old, who can beat him at 5 miles already, and who is sure to be a star."

Sen. Jo. Bailey PENS CAUTION TO HORSEMEN

New York, N. Y., May 21.—Desiring of impressing upon eastern followers of harness racing the critical condition of their sport, H. K. Devereux, president of the following letter, made public today, the following letter from Senator Joseph Bailey, of Texas, together with a prefatory appeal of his own:

"I am very much gratified by the rehabilitation of the eastern end of the grand circuit. If the events at Buffalo, N. Y., Hartford, and Reading are properly patronized by those who are campaigning stables, and if contests are provided which will attract the public, there will be no further question about suitable meetings at those places.

"I hope you and those associated with you, will be able to sufficiently impress upon all who are connected with the trotting industry, with the importance of making the meetings at Buffalo, New York, Hartford and Reading equal to the best which have ever been given over those courses. They cannot do too much in any way to help themselves as they will do now by helping to make those meetings a pronounced success."
