Head Line str Bengore Head, Capt. Hoy, arrived yesterday from Fayal, Azores, in ballast, to load for Dublin. The str is now berthed at the I. C. R. wharf.

Str Nancy Lee, Capt Murchie, under charter to the Munson Cuba line, is

scheduled to sail today for Havana, Cuba, with a general cargo.

Furness Line str Shenandoah, Capt Trinick, left this port yesterday (Sunday), for Liverpool via Halifax.

C. P. R. Strs Montcalm from Liverpool and Montrose from Antwerp both sailed last Wednesday for St. John. Manifests for 91 cars of U. S. products were received at the custom house last Saturday for shipment to the United Kingdom by the winter port str.

Bark Solway, 1599 tons net, which sailed from Newcastle, NSW, on the 21st June last for Junii, coal laden, has been given up as lost by her owners. She was commanded by Capt Rupert Salter, of Hantsport, who was about 64 years of age.

The intention of the St. John's Ndd merchants to take over the str Senlac owned by George C. Cook, of Halifax and fit her out for the seal fishery, has been abandoned and Capt Harbour, who is acting for the St. John's people, will not inspect the str as previously announced. It is claimed that before the str could be taken to the icefields she would have to be sheathed and it is now too late for the work to be done. The amount asked for the str was \$25,000.

Digby, Feb. 16.—The wrecking str Bridgewater assisted by the str Westport and Hugh D. have been unsuccessful in floating the schr Mina German, before reported ashore on Brier Island, and it is feared that she will now become a total loss, as she lies in an exposed position. Digby with the rest of western Nova Scotia tonight in the grip of a most severe northeast gale and snowstorm. The schr Dorothy M. Smart, homeward bound from the banks, is out in it being reported down the bay. The schooner bark Calburga was towed to sea this afternoon bound to Buenos Ayres. It is three months since the vessel came through Digby Gut to load lumber at Annapolis. When first ready for sea the Calburga was driven ashore in Annapolis river by wind and ice, and afterwards floated by the govt str Stanley and brought down the river, surveyed, was then held her deckload to make her seaworthy. The crew arrived from St. John yesterday.

Sydney, Feb. 16.—The arrival of the Reid, Ndd Co's new str Bruce at North Sydney, today was an event of surpassing interest to throngs of people and though somewhat disappointing that she did not reach her dock still the welcome accorded her officers and crew was deeply gratifying to all. The Bruce all day yesterday steamed through fields of heavy ice and arrived off Low Point early today. Owing to a slight accident to her machinery she did not get nearer than a mile from the wharf, though the mails and a number of passengers came ashore. Repairs are being effected by North Sydney machinists and she will move into the dock tonight or early tomorrow. The new Bruce has all the improvements that Capt Delaney's 12 years of service on her, for he was promoted to superintendent of the Reid fleet the year before she was lost. Reid fleet has been utilized also and it is safe to say that this vessel can do the same work in ice that this vessel can. The business men of North Sydney tendered a banquet to Capt Spracklin and officers tonight at the Belmont Hotel in honor of the arrival of the new str.
