MORE IMPERIAL CREDIT UNDER CONSIDERATION

Sir Thos. White to Meet Bankers' Association Today—Outcome of Success of Second War Loan.

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—The exceptionally successful flotation of the new war loan whose over-subscription is in excess of one hundred million dollars is to be followed immediately by arrangements for further imperial credit.

Tomorrow Sir Thomas White will meet here representatives of the Canadian Bankers' Association when the question will be further discussed. Dollar credits in Canada are vital to the maintenance of the Allied munition and supply industry in this country. Orders may be expected in the ratio to the ability of Canada to temporarily finance them by the required credits.

So far \$150,000,000 of such credits have been established. It is anticipated that at least another fifty million will now be provided.
