

Exchange Prisoners. Finnish prisoners of war in German Finnish prisoners of war in Germany and German prisoners in Finland will be exchanged with all possible des-dent and deported or internet evil-ian antionals on either side sent home. Then follow stipulations concerning tamnesty, return or compensation for merchant ships, etc., for settlement of questions relative to the Aland Islands and providing that fortifica-tions on the islands will be removed as speedily as possible and the permanent non-fortification of the islands regu-lated by special agreement. Instruments of ratification are to be exchanged in Berlin as soon as pos-sible.
