Messrs. McLaughlan & Wilson's lumer mill on the Hayward brook, west o Petitcodiac, is doing a very profitable business for its owners. Bonnell, mill wright. This mill turns out two and a half million feet of sawn lumber per year. A branch road is laid from the mill connecting with E. & N. A. R. This firm pay over three thousand dollars per annum for railway freight.
