AVAILABILITY OF FUNDING FOR NATIVE PEOPLE IN
NEWFOUNDLAND—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Stan Schellenberger (Wetaskiwin): Madam Speaker, I rise under the provisions of Standing Order 43 on a matter of urgent and pressing necessity. In view of the fact that the estimates approved recently in the House allocate funds for programs and services to the native people of Newfoundland, and realizing that these funds have not yet been received by the rightful recipients, and that these people are now at the end of their bank credit limits and are in serious financial difficulty, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Prince George-Bulkley Valley (Mr. McCuish):

That the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development be instructed to direct his counterpart in Newfoundland immediately to see that these federal funds are allocated as soon as possible to the legal recipients.

CONGRATULATIONS ON ACHIEVEMENT OF RECORD-BREAKING
EXPORTS—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43
