Farmers who made application for soldiers in training at London to assist them in the harvest field were disappointed. Although the soldiers are permitted to go, none of them volunteered for the work.

Dr. James Doull, of New Glasgow, N. S., has received a commission as lieutenant in the army medical corps and will leave shortly for the front. The doctor is a brother of E. M. Doull, manager of the Royal Bank at Glencoe.

The Galt Reporter says—Rev. James Malcolm, of Newbury, is visiting friends in the city, and is welcomed by his acquaintances here. Mr. Malcolm will take the Central church pulpit for the two weeks of his stay here.

The farmer is a busy man these days. On account of the wet weather he has suffered many delays in his work. There is a big acreage of hay to take off yet, while the wheat is being cut and barley and oats will be ready in a few days.

Miss M. McEachran, principal of the Glencoe High School, has been in Toronto for the past three weeks and is still there examining in Middle School. Results of the Middle and Upper School examinations will not be published for some time yet.

Alex. Ferguson, aged 81 years, a pioneer of Moss township, was buried on Thursday. He lived south of Alvinston with an aged sister, who survives him. Their home was destroyed by fire a month ago. Duncan Taylor, a nephew, resided in Glencoe a few years ago.

London and St. Thomas and surrounding country were visited by a severe storm of rain and hail accompanied by wind and lightning on Monday afternoon, and much damage was done. Around Belmont several cattle were killed by lightning, trees were uprooted and telephone lines blown down. Standing crops were levelled to the ground in many places.

Last Saturday evening, at Hazel Bush Camp on the London Road, Messrs. Allen King and Randolph Churchill entertained ten guests at a marshmallow roast. The guests were Miss Casey and Miss Walsh, of Chicago; Miss Violet and Alf George, Miss Anna Kook, Will Nethercott, Bruce Dobson and George Kook, chaperoned by Mrs. J. Gould and Mrs. H. Kook.

The Petrolia Advertiser says:—Messrs. Graves & Wilson, of Glencoe, have purchased the Petrolia Flour Mills as it stands since the fire. It is their intention to put in a stock of feed, and gradually fix up the building for flour manufacturing. Both are young men, and coming from the Scotch settlement of Glencoe, are thoroughly conversant with the oatmeal trade.

A quiet wedding took place at the home of Mrs. Mary A. Sterling, Thamesville, on Friday, when her daughter Olive was united in marriage to Hugh S. Gunn, of Winnipeg. Only immediate relatives and friends were present. Revs. T. T. George, of Thamesville, and Geo. Weir, of Glencoe, officiated. Mr. and Mrs. Gunn are spending a few days in Glencoe and Rondeau before leaving for their home in Winnipeg.

Ten hundred to fifteen hundred people, mostly women and children, were drowned on Saturday morning in the Chicago River, when the steamer Eastland turned over at the dock. The vessel was leased by the Illinois Transportation Company, and was crowded with 2,800 excursionists of the Western Electric Company. Faulty construction of the boat, overcrowding, and carelessness of the crew, are circumstances that are believed to have contributed to the disaster. Officials of the transportation company have been arrested and a thorough investigation is being made.

A. B. Gillies returned on Friday from a three months' visit in California, during which he visited the Panama Exhibition, which he describes as one of the best world's fairs ever held. The Canadian section particularly being greatly admired. Mr. Gillies was the guest of Mr. McRae, formerly of Aldborough, who owns a large ranch at Chico. The land in the valleys is rich and productive and is devoted principally to raising almonds and citrus fruits, and being worth from two hundred to ten hundred dollars an acre according to location and improvements made, is cultivated with as great care as the finest gardens.

Western Crop Prospects.

Toronto, July 27.—M. H. MacLeod, general manager of the Canadian Northern Railway system, who is in the city, talks interestingly of the crop situation in the West.

"I have been all over western Canada," he said, "having travelled at least 8,000 miles during the past month. Naturally I followed our own lines of railway, but not altogether and I also did considerable travelling by motor and on horseback. I found the prospects everywhere indicated a tremendous crop and of fine quality. The grain everywhere was heading well and in good condition.

"I look for a crop absolutely without record or parallel in our history. Our own lines are preparing to carry 100,000,000 bushels of western wheat. Our highest record up to this time is 70,000,000 bushels.

Speaking generally of prospects in the west, Mr. MacLeod said the big crop would improve conditions materially. He estimated the total yield at 225,000,000 bushels of wheat, and said cutting would commence in Manitoba on Aug. 15. There was always danger of local damage by hail, and the ever-present possibility of frost.

Abolish the Tight Rein.

With the hot weather, the Humane Society appeals to horse owners to discontinue the use of the tight check-rein. Penalties of \$5 and costs have been imposed elsewhere on men using the tight overhead checks. Leading firms in Toronto absolutely prohibit it in the case of their own horses. The check-rein is condemned by veterinarians as the cause of many evils, amongst them distortion of the windpipe. The loss of efficiency is, however, with many owners the minor consideration, for a horse pulling a load with his head held in by a check-rein cannot throw his weight into his collar, and is thus hindered from giving his body that position which is the most natural and effective.

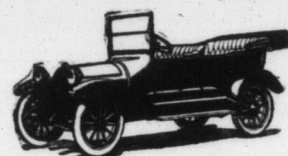
