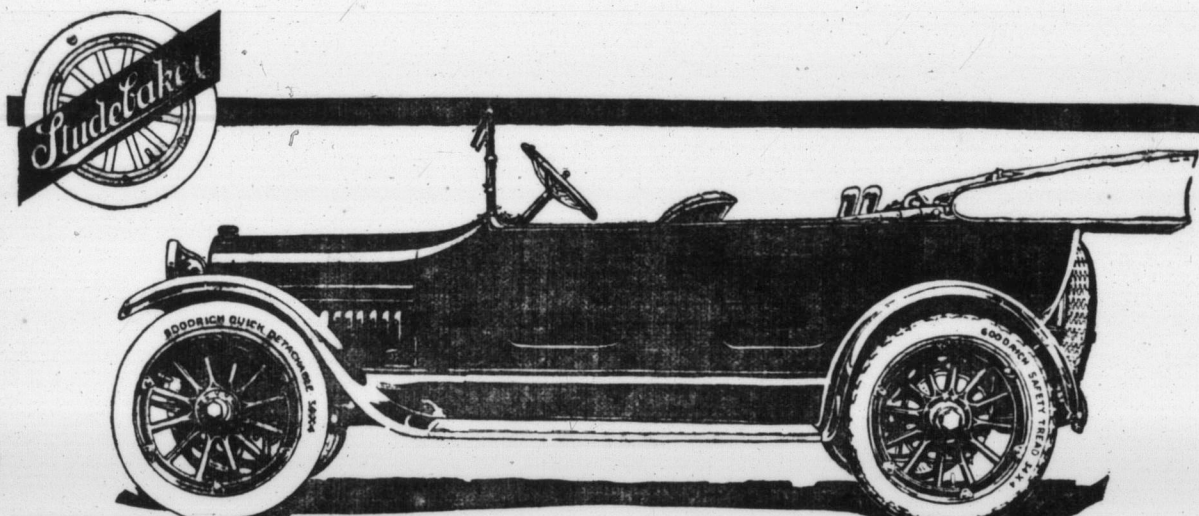

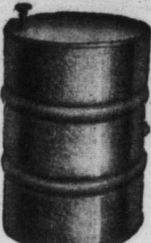
Elijah Sutton intends going West on Wednesday.

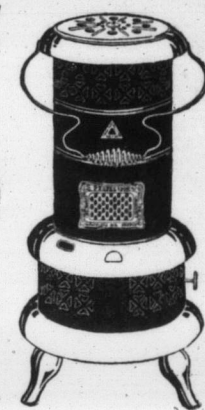
