



A trip over the Victoria and Sidney railroad is now a pleasure, provided you make it in their new gasoline-electric car. The three trips made each day by this car to the city and back again are a great convenience to the residents of this district, and its clean, tidy, well-lighted and well ventilated interior is a source of great pride not only to Conductor Shade and his crew, but to the public as well. The old days of the steam engine, with its cloud of dust and smoke pervading every corner of the passenger coaches is gone, we hope for ever.

This new mode of locomotion is practically in its infancy, as there are not by any means a large number of them in existence. This particular car was built by the General Electric Co., at their Schenectady, N. Y., shops, and is equipped with an eight cylinder, four cycle engine developing 175 horse power, and is capable of a sustained speed of 35 miles per hour. It is one of sixty similar cars manufactured by the above named company, the others being distributed throughout the western portion of the United States, but mostly in Minnesota, and in Texas and Oklahoma, where numbers of them are in service. There is but one other in Canada and it is operated by the Canadian Northern in eastern Ontario.

ROBERT'S BAY WHARF STARTED

When Completed It Will Be a Great Convenience to Small Craft in these Waters

Mr. A. Raynes, of South Salt Spring Island, the Dominion government pile driving expert, and his gang of men are now busily engaged in building the new wharf at Robert's Bay. When completed this wharf will fill a long felt want to owners of launches and small boats in and around Sidney. In the past these small craft had no convenient place to land or take on passengers, except at the wharf at Beacon avenue, and this was not a very convenient place.

Robert's Bay is the only sheltered place for small craft anywhere near the town and this means of getting in and out to them will be greatly appreciated. The wharf is 974 feet long and extends out over the shallow water and sand bar to deep water. It is constructed of two rows of piles six feet apart. On these are placed 4 by 12 stringers and the flooring will be laid on these. A large float, 32 by 29, will be built at the outer end, so that the launches and boats can be convenient-

ly boarded. On this float a shed 10 by 12 will be built for the convenience of those using the wharf.

Cedar piles are being used as far as the sand bar goes and from there to the end fir piles will be used including the raft.

Mr. Raynes is an old hand at the job of pile-driving, having been employed twenty-one years by the Provincial government at this one class of work along the coast of British Columbia, and has erected practically all the wharves now in existence on the islands and along the mainland. Two years ago he began work for the Dominion government and since that time has built four or five wharves, including the ones at Deep Bay and Retreat Cove. As soon as his present job is completed he will move his pile driver around to the Sidney wharf and place the eighteen creosote piles in position under that structure. These piles were brought over from New Westminster recently. They are fifty feet in length and cost laid down here in the neighborhood of forty-five cents per foot.
