TOWN AND VICINITY

The annual Thanksgiving supper of the Presbyterian W.M.S. is being held on Thursday, November 6.

Thanksgiving Day this year will be observed on Monday, November 10. Business places in town will be closed.

The price of bread was raised from 10 cents to 11 cents for a one and a half pound loaf here as elsewhere on Friday.

The usual armistice day two-minute silence will be observed on Tuesday, November 11, at 11 a.m. throughout the British Empire.

The potato crop in Middlesex county this year is reported by the department of agriculture to be 20 per cent. lighter than in 1923.

A meeting of the West Middlesex (Provincial) U.F.O. will be held in the Community Hall, Mount Brydges, Thursday, November 13th, at 2 p.m.

Before County Magistrate Zappe on Monday the adjourned case of Wm. Booker, charged by Benjamin Brooks with the theft of a plow, was dismissed.

Calvert Reycraft, of Newbury, and George D. Hurley, of Glencoe, are contesting Ford salesmen in a contest, which closes December 30, for the Ford Motor Company's farmer campaign.

The annual religious education convention (S. S. and Y. P. S.) of Ridgeway district will be held in the Methodist church, Glencoe, Thursday, November 27th, with morning, afternoon and evening sessions.

Thos. Henry's sale of Western cattle at the fair grounds on Saturday brought out quite a few buyers, and good average prices were realized. Mr. Henry is returning to his home in Saskatchewan on Saturday.

While lifting sugar beets on Monday afternoon, Alex. Pole, of Ekfrid, was severely hurt. The horse which he was driving kicked out when a whiffetree struck it on the heel, Mr. Pole receiving the force of the blow.

The net weight of a wagonload of sugar beets delivered at the C. N. R. yards in Glencoe was 9,575 lbs. Wagon and beets together weighed 11,550 lbs. This should settle any argument as to the amount of beets that could be hauled in one load by one team.

Glencoe high school football team visited Thamesville on Monday afternoon and had a friendly game with the school team of that town. Neither team scored. Glencoe team left for Alvinton yesterday afternoon to play a game with the school team there.

County Magistrate Peter J. Morrison presided over 78 cases during the month of October, mostly speeders, and collected \$550 in fines out of \$570 imposed. Constable Fred Black was responsible for capturing the majority of motor car drivers who were exceeding the speed limit.

Glencoe Methodist church school-room was artistically decorated in appropriate style on Friday evening, when the Ladies' Aid held a Halloween dinner. Excellent music was furnished by the high school orchestra. The ladies were well pleased with the proceeds, which amounted to \$100.25.

The first touch of winter was felt on Sunday when a stiff nor'wester brought suggestions of snow flurries and during the night lowered the temperature sufficient to form ice under a cloudy sky. The end of a long spell of glorious Indian summer weather has evidently been reached. Rain is still badly needed.

On Saturday the junior branch of the Women's Auxiliary of St. John's church gathered to welcome Mrs. Bowen, of London, who came to address them on missionary work. She described her work amongst the Eskimoes and their curious customs interested the children. Recitations and a pianoforte solo were part of the program. The children entertained adult friends to tea after the meeting.

John McMurchy, Victoria street south, has received word of the death of his brother Archibald at his home in Reston, Manitoba. The late Mr. McMurchy formerly resided on the David Newbigging farm, Aldborough-Dunwich townline, moving to Manitoba several years ago. He was about 78 years of age and leaves a large family.

Mrs. C. E. Turner, formerly Miss Annie Siddall, of Glencoe, took a prominent part in the program at the annual rally of the Ingersoll Methodist Young People's League held recently, and also at the anniversary services of the Ingersoll Baptist church, rendering vocal numbers which were highly appreciated, as reported in the local press.

Stock raisers in the vicinity of Appin will be among the exhibitors at the Guelph winter fair being held this year from November 10 to 13. Basil Perry will have an exhibit of Herefords; Wm. McTaggart will show beef cattle and Oxford sheep, and D. Johnston Oxford sheep; Peter Johnston will have an entry of Shropshire sheep, and W. S. O'Dell Hereford cattle.

The Provincial Fire Marshal was in town on Monday and called out the fire department in order to test the efficiency of the town's fire protection. He expressed himself well pleased with the town's water supply tanks and stated that the fire department in general was as good as the average. His report and recommendations, if any, will likely be received in the course of a few days.

WEEKLY PAPERS GONE

The meeting of the Western Ontario division of the weekly newspaper publishers, held in London, last Friday, brought out the interesting fact that there are today forty-five fewer weekly papers published in the eight counties represented than there were ten years ago. The eight counties are Essex, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Middlesex, Norfolk, Oxford and Perth. When the war broke out in 1914 there were 99 papers in these counties, and today there are only 54, which means that the greatly increased cost of publication has wiped out 45 weekly papers, a loss of nearly 46 per cent. The greatest falling off was in Lambton, there being now only five weekly papers in the county, compared with fifteen in 1914. It is those publishers who advanced their rates to a living basis that have survived. There has been a similar falling off all over the Dominion.—Forest Free Press.
