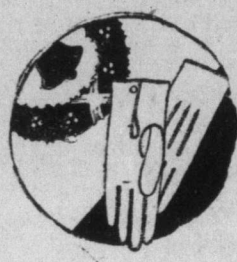

OFFER TO DEMPSEY

French Fight Promoter Wants Match in Paris.

Brussels, Dec. 15--The Belgian Olympic committee today, issued the official programme for the Olympic games next summer as follows:

Yachting, July 24 and 31; shooting to be completed at Beverloo, July 15 and Aug. 2; polo to be contested at Ostend, August 3 and 8; archery, August 9 and 10; bicycling, August 15 and 23; tennis, August 15 and 29; Greece-Roman wrestling and boxing August 27 and 31; wrestling August 24 and 27; fencing August 24 and 27.

U.F.O. PLEASED WITH DRURY

Must Adhere to U.F.O. Platform and Program Whether in Castle or

FIGHTING SPEECHES BY RAN

The formal motion of endorsement which was carried by the U.F.O. Conv reads in part:

"Whereas the cause of better government of Ontario has been the central interest in the minds of Ontario;

"And whereas the persistent demands of the Province for greater economy in public affairs has resulted in the Government;

"And whereas the success of this will depend upon an absolute adherence to the platform of the United Farmers upon the idea of the greatest good to the people--whether they reside in castle or

"And whereas the representative of to be done in the Province renders it imperative that the present Government should not decline policy without due care, investigation and

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we, Farmers of Ontario, endorse the action of the U.F.O. in taking steps to select a member in the Province of Ontario;

"And also reaffirm our position in the of this Province as expressed in the Provincial

"And finally desire to urge upon the seriousness of responsibility involved in the trust which has been placed in its hands."

TORONTO, Dec. 18.--To the 2,500 delegates of the United Farmers of Ontario, who filled every corner of Massey Hall last night, Hon. Ernest C. Drury, Premier of the Province, put this question: "Shall we give class legislation, or shall we not?" And the great hall reverberated with a thunderous "No."

"I knew that answer would come," said the Premier. "You are farmers, but first of all you are citizens, and you want no class legislation. You want us to give to this Province government of the people, by the people, for the people."

The sentiment of the meeting that found expression in the single word of reply to the Premier's question was in accord with the above resolution endorsing the choice of Mr. Drury as the U.F.O. Leader and endorsing his selection of the Cabinet.

Premier Drury said in reply: "I thank you most sincerely for your expression of confidence. It is with a feeling of great humility as well as with a recognition of the honor you have conferred upon me and the men behind me that I accept your reaffirmation of the action of the members elected to the Political Committee in selecting me as leader. I assure you I shall honestly and fearlessly and humbly endeavor to realize your expectations of myself and of the Cabinet."

In solemn words Colonel J.Z. Fraser, warned the Premier and his Minister that with victory comes responsibility, and with success renewed obligations. No longer, he reminded the Premier and his colleagues, were they representatives of the United Farmers of Ontario. They had been called to higher things, and in their acceptance of the call had transferred their allegiance to the great common people of the Province, the men and women of all classes and creeds and parties, to whom they must look for support and encouragement, and in whose interests their labors must be spent.

"I would remind you that you should go carefully, having regard for all things. I would warn you to be careful in utterance. A word once uttered can never be recalled. Be careful in promise; every promise given is a mortgage against you that will be hard to liquidate. Deal wisely with all questions and work for the good of all."
