

stone is erected to her memory. His second wife whom he married in New York on the 27th of March, 1805, was named Elizabeth Walker. She died in 1831 and is also interred in the old burial ground. The house on the corner was finished but never occupied by James Scoullar. He died in New York, where he had gone to procure furnishings for the new house, on the 13th day of July, 1825, in the 58th year of his age.
