Study in Material Evolution That Is Very Interesting at the Present Time—How One Thing Led to Another.

The story of the development of the water power at Sault Ste. Marie and the building up of the many in-dustries that now surround the St. Mary's River, presents a study in evolution that is as interesting as many a romance. The central figure evolution that is as interesting as many a romance. The central figure, of course, is Francis H. Clergue, who was despatched by a company of financiers looking for investment, to ascertain what opportunities existed along the basin of the St. Lawrence for hydraulic development. Mr. Clergue, in prosecuting his search, traversed the entire country between Cape Breton and Port Arthur and traversed the entire country between Cape Breton and Port Arthur and found various important water powers, but until the Soo was reached no point was located where hydraulic power could be economically and advantageously developed. With Lake Superior for a millpond and a fall of 20 feet, conditions appeared most favorable for the establishment of a plant that would supply power to an unlimited number of factories.

After the water power was develop-

After the water power was developed, there was no rush of applications from manufacturers, and the company were forced to consider how pany were forced to consider how they would utilize the power. From an examination of the forests, it was found that spruce was the only wood that could be brought to the works at a reasonable cost. It was, ac-cordingly, decided to begin the manu-facture of pulp, and two hundred and fifty thousand dollars was set aside for the construction of a mill. This for the construction of a mill. This was for works with an output of twenty tons of pulp a day, but it was soon found that it would cost as much to run a mill that size as as much to run a mill that size as one much more extensive—except for the labor charges and increased cost of raw materials—and the works were accordingly enlarged until they had a capacity of one hundred cords of

How Dry Pulp Was Secured.

The next step was the endeavor to obtain a machine by which the water could be extracted from the liquid pulp, so that the freight charges on pulp, so that the freight charges on over half of the product of the mills might be saved. This liquid pulp contains from 50 to 55 per cent. of water, and on account of the great cost of transportation it would be impossible to ship it to the European markets. In addition to this, a great deal of the resinous matter remains in the fibre and when exposed mains in the fibre and when exposed mains in the fibre and when exposed to a changeable climate become decomposed and gives the green stain which is seen in pine boards that have not been properly seasoned.

It was impossible to find a paper

It was impossible to find a paper machine maker who would undertake to construct the required mill to produce dry pulp. Mr. Clergue himself finally designed the machine, and to build it found it necessary to construct a machine shop, and then decided that they should have a foundry. So that with the object of obtaining dry pulp, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars more were expended in the erection of subsidiary works.

West Sulphite Mill Led Te. The next step in the evolution was a sulphite pulp mill. It was found that with a slight increase in the cost, the ground wood, pulp which sold at a very low price could be greatly enhanced in value by making it into chemical pulp. For this, sulphur was required, and a mine was purchased at Sudbury for which purchased at Sudbury, for which \$100,000 was paid. Then the sul-phite paper mill was built, with about the same capacity as the first. It was then found that the residue

of the product of the mine after the sulphur had been extracted left an al-loy of nickel and steel superior to anything that had ever been used. It anything that had ever been used. It was shown to Krupp, the Germangun manufacturer, who at once made a contract for a supply for five years. This necessitated the erection of reduction works and a ferro-nickel plant. For these processes of manufacture were required certain chemicals, certain alkalies. So it was necessary to establish an alkali plant. The salt was easily obtainable at Windsor or Goderich on the plant. The sait was easily obtainable at Windsor or Goderich on the lakes. What was needed out of it for refining purposes was the sodium, but the chlorine was not allowed to go to waste. Chlorine is universally made into bleaching powder, principally in England, which is over fifty per cent. line. The company at once went to work and pumped the

once went to work and pumped the chlorine gas through a glass pump into lime water, which was then utilized to bleach the sulphite pulp. It was then found that the sulphite pulp mill was not using all the sulphurous acid gas generated at the refining works, and as no by-product was allowed to escape, means were devised to utilize the surplus. A process was found by which the gas could be compressed into liquid sulphurous acid for the use of ore refiners and in the arts. With this purpose in view, the sulphurous acid pose in view, the sulphurous acid plant was built and its product was shipped in iron tanks at about one-half of the former price of sulphur.

Transportation Facilities Fellowed. The construction of these mighty industries required additional means of transportation, both by lake and of transportation, both by lake and rail, and the Algoma Central & Hudson Bay Railway was built with over one hundred miles of track. There were also purchased, built and chartered a fleet of sixteen steamers, of which two have been carrying passengers and freight between Toledo, Ohio, and Georgian Bay points and the Soo.

In addition to these industries there have been erected the Bessemer Steel Works, blooming mill and rail mill, the saw, lath and shingle mills, at various points, the water, electric light and power services in the towns on both sides of the river, as well as the street railway systems.—G. C. Porter, in The Toronto Sunday World.
