PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[February 10 to February 16] DURING the week under review there was great activity on several of the battle fronts, but, except in Armenia, no important changes were effected.

On the Western front fierce fighting prevailed all week throughout the whole line from the Vosges to the Alps. The Germans were able to make considerable gains in the Champagne and Aisne districts, and in the Ypres salient. The trenches taken from the Allies at those points were mostly retaken, but the week's work was accomplished by a brilliant feat of arms in a desperate struggle. The event is of prime importance, and will have far reaching effect in the further prosecution of the war in Asia Minor.

GERMANS IN GOVERNMENT EMPLOY
