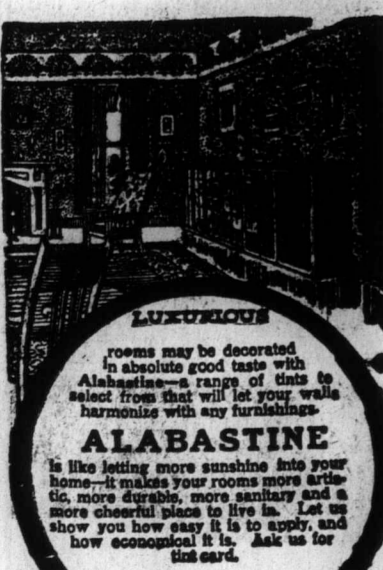

HALIFAX, N.S., April 9.—Dr. A. F. Miller, superintendent of the Nova Scotia Provincial Tuberculosis Sanitarium, who has been investigating the Friedmann treatment in New York, returned today and has reported to the government that he was not impressed with his observations of Dr. Friedmann's cases and had declined to invite him here until he had attained more definite results. Dr. McAuley of the Halifax board of health, who is also in New York, "watching" Dr. Friedmann's cases, has informed the city authorities that Dr. Friedmann has assured him he would have his serum on the market in six or eight weeks.

CARPENTERS HOLD MEETING

Union Meeting Was Held in The City Last Evening.

The United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners held their regular meeting Wednesday evening. A communication from Gen. Pres. Kirby, granting a further dispensation at the \$2.00 rate to join, was received and filed. The monthly financial statement from general secretary Duffy showed a net asset of \$341,000 in real estate and cash deposits in various banks in Canada, and the United States, the total membership having increased to over 250,000. The local union is recorded as having 38, having more than tripled their membership during the past ten months. The Brotherhood has long been recognized as being the largest craft organization in the world. The delegate to the provincial conference of the Brotherhood reported that the convention was productive of much good, but was sorry to say that the local conditions were far from the average conditions throughout the province, most of the placer men working only eight hours per day with Saturday afternoon off the year round. The meeting then adjourned.

New Steamship Line.
—EDMONTON, Abt., April 9.—Vice President Dalrymple of the Grand Trunk Pacific, confirms the report that the company may establish a steamship line between their terminals on the Pacific coast and points in Great Britain and elsewhere in Europe. Mr. Dalrymple says the matter is under consideration and will be undertaken if business warrants it on the completion of the Transcontinental line.
