Sir.—Will you kindly allow me,  
through the medium of your valuable  
paper, to pass some remarks for the  
benefit of the sporting public, re Pro-  
test S. O. E. against Duffs. In the  
first place, according to the Constitu-  
tion, the Secretary of the League  
must notify in writing, the parties  
concerned, to attend meeting, to de-  
fend the case. This he did not do.  
He has on several occasions failed to  
do so. I consider in fairness to the  
Duffs that as the Referee was not  
present and only witnesses of the S.

O. E. were heard, the finding of the  
so-called Protestant Committee is not  
legal. They do not seem to know any-

game. With regard to the Referee,
