Donald Guthrie was born in Scot land in the year 1840. Fourteen years later he came to Canada, and in 1859 he took up his residence in the then town of Guelph. He was called to the Bar in 1866. He was created Q.C. in 1876, also by the Governor-General, the Marquis of Lansdowne, in October, 1885. He was made a Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada in 1882, and stood high on the list of thirty elected Benchers in the succeeding elections for five-year terms. At every month by Mr David L. Wright the time of his death he was a Bencher for life. Since 1895 he had been Inspector of Registry Offices for Ontario.
