RUSSIA PREPARES FOR A SWEEPING NEW OFFENSIVE AGAINST THE FOE ON THE RIGA

Equipped With Great Quantities of FORTY PERSONS Munitions, and Backed by Large Reserves, She Will Renew Bat'le

London, Jan. 9.—The Russians are preparing to launch a great new offensive in the Riga sector, according to a Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, quoting German newspaper correspondents on the eastern front. The Russian troops are said to be equipped with great quantities of munitions and backed by large reserves. Near Nitau and south of Riga the artillery fire is reported to have now become extremely violent. The weather is frosty and clear and the country covered with snow.
