BRITISH GAIN ON WESTERN FRONT

Drive Into Foe Trenches on a Front of 1,150 Yards STRUCK THE GERMANS AT Three Different Points of Attack

London, Feb. 21.—The British conducted three successful operations last night at three important points on the western front, and were rewarded for their efforts by gains on an aggregate front of 1,150 yards.

South of Arrmentieres, the scene of sharp fighting in the last two weeks the German position was penetrated to a great depth on a front of 550 yards and 44 prisoners were taken.

Southeast of Ypres, in the region where the Germans are expected to strike in their coming offensive, the British troops raided the enemy's lines on a front of 500 yards and penetrated to his support line.

Great Damage. "Great damage was done to the enemy's defenses," declared the war office statement.

On the Somme front a section of the German trenches north of Guedecourt almost immediately south of Baupume, was seized and 21 prisoners taken in.

In all these operations the British casualties were slight, according to the announcement.

Near Arrmentieres. "The enemy's trenches south of Arrmentieres were entered by us from a front of some 650 yards. Our troops penetrated deeply the enemy's position, inflicted many casualties and captured 44 prisoners."

Our artillery was active during the day north of the Somme and at a number of points between Arrmentieres and Ypres.

IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR BARRED

Long Step Toward Absolute Prohibition Taken in the U. S. KEEP DRY STATES DRY By Forbidding the Importation of Liquor

Washington, Feb. 22.—Absolute prohibition legislation took its long-step forward stride in the national history yesterday, when the House, after two hours of uproarious debate, approved by a four-to-one margin a Senate measure which would raise an ironclad barrier against importation of liquor into prohibition states.

The provision is regarded as the most far-reaching that could be enacted by the Federal Government and as sweeping as would be possible under any method short of a national prohibition amendment.

Advocates of prohibition are divided among themselves over the expediency of the step, some friends of the cause declaring so drastic a law would have a reactionary effect.

The vote was officially announced was 321 to 72, but a recheck of the roll changed it to 319 to 72.

DUCAL PARTY IN TORONTO. Toronto, Feb. 21.—The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, with their daughters, Ladies Maud and Blanche Cavendish, and members of their suite, arrived in Toronto this morning.
