

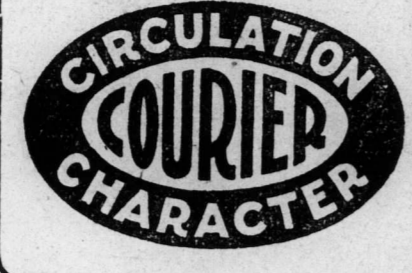

NATIONALIZATION OF ALL CANADIAN ROADS DISCUSSED

Generally Believed That Stupendous Scheme Can Be Financed

WILL BE EFFECTED MONEY FORTHCOMING

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Nationalization of all Canadian railways is freely discussed here as a solution of the problem created by the decision of the railway commission increasing freight rates by 15 per cent. The one drawback is money. It is generally believed that if such a stupendous scheme can be financed, the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk and Hudson Bay railways. But whatever may be the desire of the Government or a majority of its members, the desire can only be fulfilled if Canada can finance the hundreds of millions required for this purpose in addition to her war expenditures and the expenditure of millions for supplies for the allies, and which means continued prosperity for the country.

There is no doubt that many members of the Government desire nationalization of the remaining great railway systems, and that in this desire they are encouraged by Western sentiment and Ontario Hydro-Electric supporters. There are in the Cabinet some who seriously question the feasibility of such a stupendous undertaking, no canvassing or soliciting are being strained to secure a victorious peace in the world-wide struggle. Other ministers, believing in the principle of Government ownership, do not consider Government ownership economical or efficient.

The dominating sentiment at present, however, seems to be for national ownership and operation of the great transportation systems, and that sentiment will be given effect to—if the money requisite is forthcoming. Among the reputed aggressive supporters of the nationalization scheme are those of that persuasion who are in favor of the incorporation which is about to enter the value of the stock of their corporation shall have been determined by the situation.

The situation has been precipitated by the United States taking over the railroads there during the war, an action which synchronized with the Dominion Railway Board granting an increase of 15 per cent. in freight and passenger rates.

A Strong Fight

In the new Parliament the Ontario and Western representation will be almost a unit in favor of nationalization. If financial conditions prevent the second series as well and thus some action will be taken to modify the decision of the railway board's increase in freight rates.

No definite Government policy has yet been adopted. The committee on the subject has submitted its solution to the Cabinet. If nationalization is recommended—and it is quite within the range of probability—then there will be a fight both in the Cabinet and the commons, which will equal in intensity the clashes of last session. Nationalization will be resisted to the bitter end both by the Canadian Pacific and the parent Grand Trunk Company.

New York, Jan. 23.—The Wall Street Journal, in yesterday's edition, publishes a leading editorial on what is described as a "flare-up" in Western Canada over the agitation for Government ownership of all the railways, including the C. P. R.

"Not all of the co-operative Socialists, advocates of state Socialism, and proponents of what is called 'communism' from all the farmers, merchants and business associations combined could transfer the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the Government, even were the Government itself 'communists,'" the editorial insists. "They could eat it up, but they could not hold it a single instant, as it is known to-day and as it is of value to them to-day, after they got it. Canadians need not go one step beyond their own border to decide whether a Government-owned road can maintain its most valuable asset. George Kennedy, in fact, declared last evening that the Canadiens would not only win the first half, but that they would capture the second series as well and thus qualify, without the necessity of a play-off, to meet the western finalists for the world's championship and the Stanley Cup."

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—Of last night's hockey game, The Journal-Press says:

"Seven thousand people saw Canadians beat Ottawa, for the fourth time this season at the Arena last night. The score was 5 to 3 and the champions were the two goal mangers, the better. They were the better balanced team, conserved their energy until it was needed most and took advantage of their opportunities more so than did the Gerard men."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was in the possession of the land on the commencement of the present year, and who has continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after entering homestead patent and cultivate 60 acres a year. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

Evidence of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in the purchase of land. Local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to the local Agent. W. W. COLLY.
