All efforts on the part of the crown attorney to get off for a three o'clock appointment at Delhi proving futile.

New York, Aug. 29.—The Associated Press today issues the following:
Noyon, the southern anchor point of the German armies in the Somme battlefield, has been occupied by the French. The capture of the city by General Humbert's men had been expected for several days, and its effect on the great battle of Picardy was, therefore, largely discounted.

GIANT BATTLE GROWING DAILY MORE TERRIBLE

Has Assumed Unprecedented Extent Through the British Attack North of Somme—Allies Win Back Nearly All of Ground Lost in March

Amsterdam, Aug. 28.—The giant battle in the west is daily growing wider and more terrible, says the Cologne Gazette, and through the British attack north of the Scarpe the battle has assumed an unprecedented extent. It depicts that even the enormously long fronts in the Russo-Japanese war and the greater offensive of the present war recede into the background when compared with the present Allied offensive.

WON BACK LOST GROUND

Paris, Aug. 29.—The Allies now have won back more than two-thirds of the ground lost since the beginning of the present offensive in March. It was wrung from them by an overwhelming effort of force and they have regained it by the brilliant generalship of their leaders and the skillful manoeuvring of their troops.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Foreign importers of liquor are indefatigable in their efforts to get liquor into Toronto, but two women with unpronounceable names were neatly trapped, when a policeman masquerading as an expressman, delivered a big consignment of alcohol at their houses. They were each fined \$200 and costs in the police court today.

and his wife, a Mr. Bailey and his son, Otto from Brantford were called by the crown lawyer, Draper of Preston and a Mr. Stillewell of Hamilton were examined with the defendants, all of the witnesses were cottagers and the magistrate found the accused guilty and bound them over to keep the peace on their own recognisance.

Mr. Brown in his evidence stated that he had known Normandale for some 30 years and had spent his summer vacation there for the past five years.

He claimed that these men and some youths had been raising a rumpus near his cottage by hammering on an old derelict boat which is drawn up on the beach and has been used as a rendezvous for corn roasts and such special activities and as a general substitute for a village pump as a gossiping centre. His guests were disturbed on the evening in question and the rumpus was still on when they departed.

The Browns went over to remonstrate and here the evidence diverged as to the precise nature of the rumpus, but was positive as to the violent language and threats to injure the Browns out of Normandale. Some of the language sworn to have been used was quite profane.

There were rumors about gravel having been taken from the Brown property in the presence of the owners and later paid for and claims that the Browns claim a public roadway as his personal property. In this latter matter the registered map of the township supports Mr. Brown's proceedings were anything but complimentary to any of the parties concerned.

It is quite probable that Mr. Brown will take steps now to have the boundaries of his property clearly defined and reconnoitered. He is a man of means and business and a Norfolk wants many such summer visitors.



1. The Council of the Corporation of the City of Brantford intends to construct as Local Improvements, the Storm Sewers as contained in the following schedule, and intends to assess part of the cost on the lands abutting directly on the work.

Morrill	Burwell	Grand River	\$10,600	\$6,800
Bruce	Murray	G. T. Ry. right of way	2,520	740

2. The estimated special rate per foot frontage per annum for Morrill Street is 18.7 cents, and for Bruce Street is 10 cents, the Assessments to be paid in 20 annual instalments.

3. Petitions against the works will not avail to prevent their construction.

4. A By-Law for the above purpose will be introduced at the next meeting of the Council.
