KINGS COUNTY POULTRY CLUB.

A meeting of the Kings Co.
Poultry Club was held in the
Town Hall, Wolfville on Mon-
day, April 1st only a small num-
ber of members being present.

It was decided to hold the
next show at Wolfville on Nov-
ember 27th, 28th, 29th, subject
to a suitable building being se-
cured.

The president announced that
Sir Robert L. Borden had kind-
ly consented to present a Silver
Cup for competition among the
Kings County Poultry breeders.
This cup will be awarded for the
four best birds (cock, hen, cock-
erel and pullet) of any one var-
iety in the show, and is to be
won three years. In addition
to this, there have already been
several cups promised by pro-
minent Wolfville merchants and
others, to be awarded on dis-
plays of various breeds which,
with those already in competi-
tion, will make at least ten Sil-
ver Cups to be competed for at
the Sixth Annual Show. It is
hoped, by the management, that
every breeder in the county will
be stimulated, by this announce-
ment, to make great efforts to
hatch and rear the chickens
necessary to win one of these
cups, and help to make the show
a record success.

It is to be regretted that the
lack of interest in our poultry
industry is so great, as was
manifested by the small attend-
ance at the meeting. The Kings
County Poultry Club is great-
ly in need of members and any-
one wishing to join will be
heartily welcomed. Encourage
