**COTTON WORKERS ON STRIKE.**  
Nearly One Hundred and Fifty New England Mills Affected.

One Hundred and Twenty-Five Thousand Operatives Decline to Accept the Ten Per Cent. Reduction Which the Mill Owners Demand in Necessary Reason for the Privileges of the Dingley Bill—Stops-Throwing at New Bedford.

Boston, Jan. 18.—A reduction in the wages of about 185,000 operatives employed in nearly 150 cotton mills in New England which the manufacturers decided upon as a temporary remedy for a widespread depression in the cotton goods industry of the north, went into effect in a majority of the mills yesterday morning.

In several mill centers, however, the workers have refused to accept the reduction, and the contest thus inaugurated promises to be one of the most stubborn in the history of the textile industry.

The situation in New Bedford is viewed from a very gloomy light by the operatives here—and, besides, the prices will compare with, and the values as good, if not better, than those selected in either of the above centres of commerce.

**FATHER OF THE HOUSE**  
Passed Away Last Evening After a Long and Useful Service.

The Right Hon. Charles Pelham Villiers, M.P. for South Wolverhampton, crossed the Bar After Having Represented the Constituency Without Interruption since 1852—Seven Years Older Than Gladstone—Cable News.

London, Jan. 17.—The Right Hon. Chas. Pelham Villiers, M.P. for South Wolverhampton, and known as the "Father of the House of Commons," having sat continuously in the House since 1852, died at nine o'clock Sunday night.

**Sketch of His Career.**  
In addition to being the oldest member of the House of Commons, he was father of the Budget tax, for he was called "the Budget" in 1857. Mr. Villiers, entered Parliament two years before him, but while the service of Mr. Villiers was continuous, that of Mr. Gladstone was broken when he retired from the House of Commons.

**GOALS GO UP.**  
Anstracite Companies Have Restructured the Output and on the Recovery of the Market.

New York, Jan. 14.—Announcement was made yesterday that the Anstracite coal producing and carrying companies had advanced prices 10 to 20 cents per ton to the basis of \$3.95 per ton on board for stevedores, other prices in proportion. The advance was due to the lightness of stock, resulting from the continued operation of the output, and a shortage of the companies' stock.
