GIRL DROPPED DEAD.

Blockheads Frightened Her With a Rattling Skeleton Made From Bones of Animals.

Rochester, New York, Nov. 2.—The authorities of Allegany county are looking for persons who manufactured a skeleton out of animal's bones which frightened Mary Odfield, of Karndale, to death, Wednesday night.

Miss Odfield, accompanied by two friends was returning from a Halloween party, where they had listened to gruesome stories until their hair stood on end. When about to enter the woods a rattling of bones was heard overhead, and, looking up, the trio were overcome with horror at seeing a skeleton of gigantic proportions sweeping down on them from above. With a cry of terror, Mary dropped dead.

A searching party found a wire leading from the ground to a tree top to which was attached a skeleton with a pulley.

A SPITTER SHOT.

Bad Tempered Individual Now Locked Up For Crime.

New York, Nov.—Robt. Elkins, a shipper, was probably fatally wounded by John Sweet, a morning Elkin, taken in front of the store engaged in marking a case of goods, when Sweet passed Elkins was kneeling at the time. He turned his head without seeing Sweet, and spat upon him. Sweet became enraged, and before Elkins could arise to explain, drew a revolver and shot him. A large number of truck drivers and others who witnessed the affair started in pursuit of Sweet, who ran down the street, firing a shot, which luckily missed. His flight took him to the Mercy street police station, into which he ran for refuge. He was promptly locked up, and Elkins taken to the hospital.
