Chief of Detectives "Planted" Evidence Against Russian Officers. St. Petersburg, April 20.—M. Ponomarieff, chief of the Government detectives attached to the Lower House

tectives attached to the Lower House of Parliament, is threatened with dismissal owing to revelations made at Vfina during the trial of military officers and others charged with inspiring to import arms from Germany, the discovery of which caused M. Ponomarieff's promotion.

The court acquitted the accused on the ground that the "conspiracy" was really an invention of Ponomarieff. Evidence taken showed that Ponomarieff planned the hiding of arms, ammunition and bombs purchased abroad in pre-arranged spots, notably in the

musition and bombs purchased abroad in pre-arranged spots, notably in the stable of Col. Miasoyedoff, one of the accused officers.

Ponomarieff's main work in nection with Parliament was to fusion his confidential reports of the doings of the deputies, and it is understood that his highly colored accounts caused much of the friction between Premier Stolypin and the Lower House.

the Carolinas, destroy our winters within five years.
That is the legislation before the Canadian Parliament today. It isn't a dream of a lunatic. It is as hardhaded a proposition as ever legislators considered. The scheme, in a word, is for the United States and Canada to unite to destroy the rigors of the North American winter by blasting out the channel between the Arctic and the Atlantic, melt the long sunken ice and allow the warm current from the milder Atlantic to permeate the frozen fastnesses of the Arctic.

Arctic.

The plan is R. A. McLennan's.
He fives at Russell, Manitobs, where
it is nothing to see the mercury down
to 40 below zero on a cold winter's
morning. He is a farmer on a large
scale, one of Canada's rich men. His
hobby is to make all North America
a continent with very mild winters
and less torrid summers.

The plan has just been presented to
the Canadian Parliament. It involves
the aid of the United States as well. It

the Canadian Parliament. It involves the aid of the United States as well. It is now in the hands of Frank E. Oliver, Minister of the Interior for the Deminion of Canada. He has gone ever it very carefully, and as proof of his own conviction that it is possible he has communicated the details to several scientists of worldwide fame with a request for an opinion.

Gets Encouragement in Scheme.

Once upon a time, as geology plainly proves, North America enjoyed as baimy a climate as there was in the world. The remains of mammoths and trees and semitronic shrubbery are to

trees and semitropic shrubbery are to be found all along the edge of the Arctic circle and in northern Siberia. The great flood of Noah's time un-did all this. It made North America a land of bleak winters and scorching summers. It blocked up the channel to the Arctic and kept the warm wa-ters of the Atlantic from laving those ine locked northern shores. All this and more has been Mr. McLennan's life study

He speaks about it frankly. His ar guments seem unanswerable. As he talked about his plan with a writer to the World Magazine he grew enthu-

"Now, what caused the mild winter

siastic.

"Now, what caused the mild winter in which these fossil trees once lived?" he asked, and he answered the question himself.

"Undoubtedly," he said, "it was caused by a greater stretch of open ocean to the north than now exists. Lebrador is in the same latitude as the British Isles, the south of Greenland corresponds in this particular to Norway and Newfoundland to the north of France. Were it not for the radifying influences of this great stretch of open ocean the winters in Europe would be of Arctic severity.

"What caused the once open ocean to the north of Canada to be turned into an icefield? Beyond doubt the fact that the great ocean current which at one time flowed from the Atlantic into the Arctic became impeded by some barrier.

"It is a scientific fact which you can verify by consulting any geographer that in the bed of the Atlantic there is a channel on the east side extending from south of the equator northward and passing between the Farce and Shetland Islands at a depth of 670 fathoms. This passage is about 350 miles wide and I believe that it is through this channel that the current between the Atlantic and Arctic

550 miles wide and I believe that it is through this channel that the current between the Atlantic and Arctic oceans formerly flowed.

"Now, precise scientific calculations will show you that a current flowing through this channel at the rate of four miles an hour and at a temperature ten degrees above freezing point would allow of sufficient water to pass through to melt 1,000 cubic miles of ice a day.

ice a day.

"That is to say, in four or five years this would melt all the ice in the Arctic Ocean, and Canada, from being a country of rigorous winters, would become almost semi-tropical, and all the land which stretches in such west areas to the north of us

and all the land which stretches in such vast areas to the north of us would share in that climate and become habitable."

"My proposition," he went on, "is to petition the British Government and to get it to approach the United States Government also with the object of detaching a section of the fleets of both Powers to undertake the work after the several countries inwork after the several countries in-terested have given pledges and such securities as may be considered ade-

securities as may be considered adequate.

"If the icefield of the Arctic be stranded on one large island or on two small ones, besides coming against the north of Greenland, I would propose to break up the ice by starting in to work at the east of Greenland and then proceeding north and west. The work could also be commenced at the head of Davis Strait and Behring Strait.

"The work of breaking up the ice

commenced at the head of Davis Strait and Behring Strait.

"The work of breaking up the ice could, I believe, be done by shooting great torpedoes under the ice, so fixed that they would explode at a considerable distance. Ice floating on the surface, as the ice in the Arctic Ocean does, would be very easy to break up, as experiments have proved.

"And once broken up, the ice east of Greenland would flow out into the Arctic and melt. If the whole mass of ice were found to float out when its connection with Greenland ware severed, we should probably have to depend on Davis and Behring Straits to convey it away.

IRISH LAND BILL PASSED.

Unionists Opposed Measure Which They Describe as Pure Confiscation. London, April 20.—By a vote of 208 to 60, the House of Commons yesterday passed the second reading of the bill introduced by the Nationalist party, amending the Irish Land Acts.

Under the new law the power of

the land commissioners to acquire the land commissioners to acquire estates, sell them to tenants, and provide the purchase money, is extended so that they can compulsorily buy out such landlords as Lord Clanricardo and others who refuse to sell. The commissioners will be empowered the successful to the commissioners of the commissione

to themselves fix the prices of the estates to be so acquired. The Unionists opposed the meas-ure, which they described as being 'pure confiscation

The Attorney-General for Ireland, Mr. Cherry, in behalf of the Government, approved the principle of the measure, but he said that in consequence of the congestion of business it could not become law during the present session of Parliament.

IMPERIAL BUDGET SPEECH ...

erplus of \$26,955,000 Devoted to Re-

duce Debt.

London, April 19.—No budget statement of recent years has been awaited with so much interest as that of Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith yesterday. Although it was his second budget, that of last year really was only a legacy from the previous administration, so his proposals yesterday constituted the first real Liberal budget in 12 years. The House of Commons was thronged, and the public galleries were densely crowded. The financial statement issued by the Treasury in advance of the Chancellor's speech informed the House that the exact realized surplus for 1906-07 was \$26,955,000, which, in accordance with the law, would be devoted to the reduction of the public debt.

Mr. Asquith estimated the expensions

Mr. Asquith estimated the expenditure for 1907-08 at \$703,785,000. The revenue on the existing basis of taxation was estimated to be \$720,950,000. The permanent reduction of the na-tional debt for 1906-07 was announce

The permanent reduction of the national debt for 1906-07 was announced to be \$68,570,000.

The duty on tea was unchanged, Mr. Asquith opened his speech with a brief review of the past year, pointing out that with the exception of the stock markets, which suffered from the money stringency, trade at home and abroad had been remarkably flourishing. The Treasury receipts were over \$10,000,000 in excess of the estimates, unanticipated death duties accounting for \$6,000,000 of this sum, while the balance was made up of increased receipts from the coal duty and the mint. The latter was due to the increased demand for coinage on account of the preposterous state of trade and the large amount of silver, aggregating \$2,500,000, required for various purposes.
