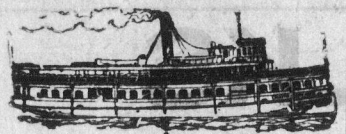

INTERNATIONAL BIBLE LESSON FOR TO-MORROW.

"The Transfiguration."—Luke 9: 28-36. Read Matt. 17: 1-13, Mark 9: 2-13.

Golden Text—This is My Beloved Son; hear Him.

From the records of the three evangelists, we infer that while He was engaged in prayer, a marvellous change came over the person of our Lord. The Divinity in Him shone through His frame till his raiment became exceeding white as the light, or as the glistening snow on the mountain peaks above Him, so as no fuller on earth could whiten them. Moreover, the fashion of His face was altered and glowed with a sunlight glory. God had in our last lesson revealed His son to their heart and mind. Now Jesus is revealed glorified to their astonished vision. We have here the privileged three, Peter, James and John, "heavy with sleep" as we find them also in Gethsemane, need we be astonished, then, to find so many drowsy hearers in our churches. When they were fully awakened they saw Moses and Elijah glorified like their Lord, "for we know if He shall be manifest, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him even as He is." 1st John, 3: 2.

They also heard these glorified ones conversing about our Lord's coming at Jerusalem; which all His earthly friends repudiated. Peter's feelings are fully aroused and he suggests a feast of Tabernacles, but the bright cloud, the Shechina, denoting the presence of God, overshadows them with awfulness and from its midst comes "This is My beloved Son; hear Him." Moses, Elijah and the prophets of Israel were all right in all. Jesus commends their silence to all men of the vision of glory. He had shown them, they had seen the Son of Man coming in His kingdom, they had glimpses of Christ, a foretaste, and foregleams of coming glory. He tells them of His cross and then shows them His glory. Friends, remember, no cross, no crown, no glory.
