Fire Protection Wanted.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN:—The fire in Chipman Hall last week shows so urgent a need in the way of means of reaching the upper floor and rest of several large buildings on the hill and in town. I feel I must call attention to the matter in your paper. All buildings of three or four stories should have safe outside ladders or fire escapes to enable the firemen to reach the upper storey or the roof. Chip Hall fire showed how difficult it is to cope with a fire under a roof, or on a third or fourth storey, without means of outside approach through a window or door. The smoke during a fire renders it impossible for men to fight fire by entering a building below. The hill buildings, especially, should be protected by such permanent ladders so that the firemen may be under the control and reach at hosemen from the outside.

It would be well to have also strong ladders available at all times to reach the roofs or fire escapes extending to the roof. As important as this also is the need of 500 feet of hose on a reel placed somewhere on college property and a few trained men to take charge of it, in order to get at a blaze before it has a chance to do as much damage as was done last week. The town has a splendid water system and fire equipment and good fire fighters. They have often saved the town from destruction, yet every high building should be provided with outside ladders. The safety of other buildings or even of the town may depend on this. It is not safe to trust to luck too long. FIREMAN.
