Violators of the Scott Act in Moncton, New Brunswick, received a severe shock lately in Magistrate Kay's court. The offending dealers were ready with a wad of bills, knowing that they would be convicted and expecting to pay the fine of fifty dollars and walk out free to continue their remunerative violation of the Act. They could not believe their ears when they heard the sentence, "one month in jail without the option of a fine." One of them, it is stated, thought it must be a mistake and proffered his wad. He was waved back and informed that their was no time to pry. The commitments are to be made out shortly and in the meantime the lawyers will see what they can do to keep the three saloon-keepers out of durance vile. Some of the legal fraternity were ready to question the legality of the sentence but upon digging up the law they found that the amendment to the Canada Temperance Act in 1904 gives the magistrate power to send violators to jail for one month for the first offence and two months for the second offence without the option of a fine in either case.

The action of the magistrate is to be highly commended. Setting aside entirely the question as to the advisability of either the Scott Act or of total prohibition the fact remains that if the act is in force at all it ought to be enforced in a way that will make it of some effect and not a dead letter. As long as dealers can continue to sell and by paying a fine of fifty dollars occasionally, evade the law and still maintain a profitable business, then the act is to all intents and purposes null and void. It is a question of maintaining the dignity of the law of the land, and the Moncton magistrate has apparently found a solution of the problem. After a few more dealers have lived upon Government fare for a month the people of Moncton at least will be able to speak with authority as to the use or uselessness of the Scott Act.—Graphic.

BATTLESHIP DOMINION

Halifax, N. S., August 6.—The British battleship Dominion, Captain Kingsmill, arrived here at nine o'clock Monday morning from Portsmouth, after an uneventful run. The ship left Spithead at 4 A. M. on July 29, and met with rough weather the first few days. She came to this side of the Atlantic at this time as the guest of Canada, and her officers and men will be royally entertained. During her five days stay at Halifax, a handsome silver loving cup will be presented to her by the citizens. The ship will be thrown open to the public and illuminated at night special preparations being made for the latter.

The Dominion will leave here at 7 A. M. on the 11th, proceeding to Charlottetown, where she will arrive on the 12th, leaving there on the 14th for Bay Chaleur, N. B., where she will arrive on the 15th, sailing again on the 16th for Quebec and remaining there until September first.

BOTTLING INDUSTRY PARTIALLY DESTROYED

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 3.—A barn on Charlotte street, used by their bottling industry was partially destroyed by fire this evening. The flames originated in the loft, and though it was quite early in the evening, made considerable headway before being discovered. Fortunately there was but little wind at the time and the firemen were able to prevent the flames from spreading. Part of the stock consisting of bottled beer was saved, but the plant was badly damaged. The firm estimates the loss at fifteen hundred dollars and had no insurance. Loss to building is about \$200, which is covered by insurance.

HINTO PROPRIETOR GETS STAY OF PROCEEDINGS.

To Fight Jail Sentence for Violation of Scott Act in Moncton

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 6.—An application of J. C. Sherron to Judge Landry today an order for stay of proceedings was issued in the King vs P. Gallagher, sentenced Thursday last by Police Magistrate Kay to one month in jail with hard labor for Scott act violation. The writ is returnable at the Michaelmas supreme court. The main ground taken is that the accused was previously convicted of Scott act violation covering the period of the second conviction.

The body of George Small, of Moncton, a young man who was killed in the C. P. R. yard at Fort William, recently, was brought here this afternoon, accompanied by George Matthews, a member of Algoma Lodge, I. O. O. F., Fort William. Small met his death while attempting to board a shunting engine; he missed his footing and was crushed so badly that he died four hours later. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon under I. O. O. F. auspices.

OUR CHEESE BEST IN THE WORLD

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 3.—Yes, we have a great deal to learn from Canada. In regard to Canadian cheese it is the finest in the world. These were the statements of Dr. C. Van Ellbrecht, of Copenhagen, Denmark, yesterday.

Dr. Ellbrecht is dairy commissioner of the Danish government, and for the last year and a half has been studying the dairy methods of the new world in Canada and the United States.

"Canada, Australia and Ireland are our greatest competitors in the world's dairy markets," he remarked regarding butter. "I think we supply about 45 per cent. of the English market. You see we are always in touch with that market. We have men there who study the English tastes and just as soon as the Englishman's taste changes our dairy men in Denmark know all about it."

WESSON, MAKER OF PISTOLS AND MILLIONS, DEAD

Springfield, Mass., Aug. 4.—After an illness of almost four years, Daniel Baird Wesson, the multi-millionaire revolver king, died in his home in Maple street this afternoon from heart failure, superinduced by neuritis.

Mr. Wesson was the founder of the firm of Smith & Wesson and had been a manufacturer of guns and revolvers all his life. He was born in Worcester (Mass.), May 1825, and came to Springfield in 1875.
