TO CHASTISE THE ALBANIANS Turkey Sends an Army of Fifteen

Moscow, Jan. 2.-The inciplent war in Macedonia has assumed a serious phase. Nikolai Pastouhoff, the editor and proprietor of the influential Moskowskij Listok, or Moscow Gazette who has just returned from Constanti-nople, says that the Sultan has sent 15,000 men post haste to the Macedonian frontier to chastise the Albanians

Mi, Pastouhoff says the Sultan has rejected the reforms in Macedonia proposed by Austria and Russia jointly, and proposes to reform the border States according to his own method. Christians on both sides of the frontier are alarmed at the despatch of Turkish troops, for Abdul Hamid has appealed to the religious prejudice of the soldiers detailed to this service, and it is not believed that serious strife and much bloodshed can be avoided in putting an end to the reign of cruelty and terror now prevailing in Albania and Southern Servia.

All despatches from Turkey regarding the Macedonian difficulty have been delayed or suppressed, M. Pastouhoff says, by the strict censorship in force.
