three-cornered fight in Ottawa, and  
the result is the election of a French-  
Canadian Mayor. It is the first time  
Ottawa has had a French Canadian  
Mayor. Mr. Parnell is a druggist  
in Lower Town, is 34 years of age,  
and a Liberal in politics. He was  
endorsed by the Allied Trades and  
Labor Council. The vote follows:

# SUES FOR DIVORCE.

A Nobleman's Daughter Tells a  
Story of Cruelty.

HER HUSBAND IS A NAVAL OFFICER.

Kingston, N. Y., Dec. 30.—Helen  
Sylvaine Cassidy has made applica-  
tion to the Supreme Court for counsel  
fee and alimony pending the action  
of a limited divorce which she has  
brought against Ensign Edward  
Rockeford Cassidy, of the United  
States navy.

Mary Helen Melaine Sylvaine Dor-  
nay de Casteau, the complete name  
of the plaintiff, is the daughter of  
a Belgian nobleman, Sienr Charles  
Gaston Sylvaine Dornay de Casteau,  
and Marie Louise Clotilde Puysson-  
aut, his wife, and lived with her  
father and mother on the family es-  
tate at Casteau, in the Province of  
Hainault, in Belgium. Edward Rocke-  
ford Cassidy is the son of the late  
William R. Cassidy, of The Albany  
Argus.

She met Mr. Cassidy in 1892. They  
fell in love and were married in Jan-  
uary, 1893. At the time of the mar-  
riage, Mr. Cassidy's mother, by an  
antenuptial settlement in considera-  
tion of the marriage, settled upon  
her son an annuity of \$5,000. In ad-  
dition to this annuity, Mrs. Cassidy set-  
tled between \$80,000 and \$70,000 up-  
on her son, and the parents of Hel-  
ene settled upon her an annuity of  
2,000.

In June last Mrs. Cassidy began  
her action for a limited divorce, al-  
leging that a month after her mar-  
riage her husband began a course of  
cruel, brutal and inhuman treat-  
ment, which continued until Decem-  
ber, 1897, when she separated from  
him and returned to her parents in  
Belgium.

Mrs. Cassidy says that her hus-  
band has repeatedly and without  
provocation struck her, beaten her,  
dragged her upon the floor and  
kicked her down with such vio-  
lence as to render her insensible. She  
also asserts that he has struck her  
in the face and has pinched her so  
as to break her finger nails, and has  
left black and blue marks and the  
impression of his fingers upon her hands,  
wrists and arms.

Mrs. Cassidy's servants also swear  
that she witnessed her in a brutal and  
inhuman manner; that they have re-  
peatedly found her unconscious from  
the effects of his violence, and have  
heard her scream for hours at a  
time when he was abusing her.

**TO CHASTISE THE ALBANIAN.**  
Turkey Sends an Army of Fifteen  
Thousand Men.

Moscow, Jan. 2.—The incident war  
in Macedonia has assumed a serious  
phase. Nikola Pastouhoff, the editor  
and proprietor of the influential Mos-  
kowsky Listok, or Moscow Gazette,  
who has just returned from Constantin-  
ople, says that the Sultan has sent  
15,000 men post haste to the Macedo-  
nian frontier at the despatch of Turk-  
ish troops, for Abdul Hamid has ap-  
pealed to the religious prejudice of  
the soldiers detailed to this service, and  
is not believed that serious strife  
and much bloodshed can be avoided in  
putting an end to the reign of cruelty  
and terror now prevailing in Albania  
and Southern Serbia.

All despatches from Turkey regard-  
ing the Macedonian difficulty have  
been delayed or suppressed. M. Pastou-  
hoff says, by the strict censorship in  
force.

**FELL DEAD AT THE FURNACE.**  
Sudden Demise of an Estimable Gait  
Lady.

Gait, Ont., Jan. 2.—Miss Jennie Mc-  
Bride, aged 35 years, eldest daugh-  
ter of Wm. McBride, foreman of the  
safe department in the Goldie & Mc-  
Loughlin's Gun Store, died very  
suddenly about 10 o'clock last  
night. Miss McBride attended  
church yesterday, as usual, appar-  
ently in the enjoyment of perfect  
health. Before retiring for the  
night she went into the basement  
of the house to look after the fur-  
nace fire, and while in the act of  
shaking the furnace dropping dead.  
Death was caused by the bursting of  
a blood vessel in the head.
