NIAGARA CAMP.

COL. HENDRIE MAKES SUGGESTIONS ABOUT ITS FUTURE.

Hon. J. S. Hendrie, of this city, has suggested to the Niagara Falls Park Commission and the historical societies of the Niagara district that they take steps to get the Dominion Government to vest the military grounds at Niagara-on-the-Lake in the commission. He agrees with the agitation against the proposal to sell the grounds, which have so many historical associations, and hopes that his project is reasonably certain of attainment. If carried out this would mean that Niagara-on-the-Lake would have as park property the grounds mentioned, with a frontage on Lake Ontario and the Niagara River connected by the strip of land along the river now vested in the commission with the Niagara Falls Park, which now extends to Lake Erie. The present, Mr. Hendrie thinks, would be an excellent opportunity to secure and retain for the people of Canada such an addition to their park lands as his project would give.

PRIESTS' SEMI-JUBILEE.

REV. FATHER CRAVEN REMEMBERED BY FORMER PARISHIONERS.

Galt, Ont., June 30.—The twenty-fifth anniversary of the ordination into the priesthood of Rev. Father Craven, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, was appropriately observed yesterday by the celebration of high mass by the pastor and the presentation to the reverend father of a beautifully illuminated address, accompanied by a purse of gold amounting to \$300. Father Craven also received a stole from the nuns of Loretto Abbey, Toronto; a silver tray and cut glass water set from the Old Boys of St. Patrick's Sanctuary, Hamilton, and an address and cheque from the Hospice congregation. The children of the Separate school also presented an address and an accompanying gift in the afternoon.

KAISER'S AMBITION

Has Been Checked by Great Britain.

London, June 29.—It is now possible to outline some of the far-reaching effects of Germany's sensational diplomatic attacks on France, and the Kaiser's other attempts to take advantage of Russia's impotence in Europe.

It already has been indicated in these despatches that the sharp check put upon German aggression was due chiefly to British initiative. The prompt view in diplomatic circles, outside of Germany, is by no means settled, but the German attitude has already changed from provocative aggression to moderate conciliation. French retaliation may yet come from Berlin, but it is the present view in diplomatic circles, outside of Germany, that the Kaiser has overreached himself, that he has alarmed the nations, and aroused the greater part of the world against him to little purpose. Never was the machinery of European diplomacy so active as now, and the sole object of international endeavor seems to be to devise an effective plan to restrain the vaulting ambition of the German Emperor.

Certain important developments may be specified.

First, the terms of an extended Anglo-Japanese treaty have been definitely agreed upon. An announcement of their nature may be expected shortly.

Second, because of this, and because she is confident that she may rely upon Japan to cancel all future Russian ambitions in the Far East, Great Britain feels less unwilling to allow Russia to seek certain expansion in the Near East, with the object of holding back the Kaiser.

Third, Great Britain is taking the most active measures to concentrate her fighting strength very near home.

Fourth, the incoming regime in Russia is full of fear of the Kaiser since he has recently shown his hand, and is anxious to unite with France and England to check German aggression.

Fifth, plans to do this without creating a false impression in Germany that an aggressive anti-German coalition is coming into being are occurring the attention of the diplomats of Western Europe and other countries.

FIRST TIME ON STREET CAR.

Plea of Boy Who Caused Accident by Releasing Brake.

Guelph, Ont., June 29.—Albert Leonard, of Creemore, the young man who released the brake and caused the street car to run away and crash into the C. P. R. freight cars, injuring many people, yesterday, appeared before Police Magistrate Sanderson this morning and admitted having turned the brake. His plea was that it was the first time he had been on a street car, and he had no knowledge of the mechanism of the car. The charge preferred against him was "Doing an act by which he endangered life," and he was remanded for one week.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnston and Mrs. Rogers are still in the hospital. Mr. Johnston's condition has not improved, but the others are much better.
