Satisfactory Statement Made by the United Empire Bank of Canada. The annual meeting of the United Empire Bank of Canada was held on Wednesday, January 15th, at the head office, corner of Yonge and Front streets, Toronto. There was a good attendance of shareholders, and the report submitted by the General Manager, Mr. G. F. Reid, was received with much satisfaction, and will be issued to the shareholders in due course. The organization expenses of the bank were very small, being \$8,300. These have been paid out of the profits of the past year, and a surplus carried forward to the credit of profit and loss. The deposits are now over \$800,000, making a very notable increase of 39 1/2 per cent. over a year ago. During the year six new branches were opened, at Hamilton (2), Galt, Coloureg, Belleville, Islington and Stirling. The President, Mr. S. Barker, M. P., referred to the probability of the bank paying a dividend in the near future. The following directors were re-elected: S. Barker, Esq., M. P., Hamilton; Mark Bredin, Esq., Toronto; George A. LARGE INCREASE IN DEPOSITS.

Trampled to Death. Erie, Pa., Jan. 20.—Ernest Holmberg, 64 years of age, was trampled to death under a horse's feet early yesterday morning. He was employed on the farm of Mrs. E. Knobloch, of West Millereek, and was last seen engaged in cleaning horses in the stables. This was at 6.30 o'clock. Other men were in other parts of the barn, milking. He was heard singing, and at times speaking to the horses. A loud cry alarmed the help a few minutes later and they ran into the horse barn quickly with their lights. One of the horse was trampling about in his stall, unasily, and under his hoofs lay the body of Ernest Holmberg. It was an easy matter to get the man out, for the horse was in no way fractious. There was still some life flickering, but it went out very soon after the body was dragged from under the horse. A loud cry alarmed the help a few minutes later and they ran into the horse barn quickly with their lights. One of the horse was trampling about in his stall, unasily, and under his hoofs lay the body of Ernest Holmberg. It was an easy matter to get the man out, for the horse was in no way fractious. There was still some life flickering, but it went out very soon after the body was dragged from under the horse.

SOVEREIGN BANK. Preliminary Steps to Winding Up Bank. Toronto, Ont., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—A preliminary step towards winding-up proceedings against the Sovereign Bank was taken on Saturday by the filing of material at Osgoode Hall. The nature of the material was not divulged, as Fulford Arnoldi, in whose hands it was placed, was not to be found when the representatives of the press tendered the usual fees for searching public documents. This morning Mr. Arnoldi protected himself further by obtaining an order from Chancellor Boyd and the Chief Justices of the Divisional Courts instructing him not to exhibit the papers filed until further notice. It is understood that the filing of the papers was largely a precautionary measure by parties heavily interested in the Sovereign Bank, and that no further steps will be taken if the transfer of the business to the other banks and the arrangements for the liquidation of the Sovereign Bank's assets is carried out to the satisfaction of these parties.

A Little Romance. Hamilton Woman Finds Husband With Another Wife. Chicago, Ill., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Divorced fifteen years since she spent four years in an insane asylum in Hamilton, Mrs. Theresa Wood, insane woman, followed her husband to Milwaukee, persuaded him to marry her again. She made her way to his home and seeing his present wife, is said to have attempted to attack her. It was found necessary to place her under arrest as she was violent and threatened harm to some one. She will be returned to Hamilton as soon as matters can be arranged.
