When the St. John Knights of Py-
thias put their play on at the Opera
House Oct. twelfth, to fifteenth, A
Fool for Luck, they will, without
any doubt, have the largest orches-
tra that has ever played at the Opera
House, having twenty-two men under
the able direction of Allen Crawford
and F. C. Jones. They are rehear-
sing every other night with the com-
pany. There will be in all upon the
stage on those nights seventy-four
people, all singing in harmony under
the direction of A. Chip Ritchie,
which is a guarantee of its being
good. The chorus is being drilled by
him every night. Taken as a whole,
it will be a very fine performance
and one that would do credit to
many professional companies, so says
Mr. H. M. Gardner, of New York, un-
der whose direction the entire produc-
tion is to be given.

"The Burgomaster."

The musical comedy, The Burgo-
master, was presented for the first
time in this city at the Opera House
on Wednesday evening by Mr. William
P. Cullen. The piece is a thoroughly
enjoyable one, full of laughable sit-
uations, pretty and catchy music and
splendid stage pictures. The adven-
tures of Peter Stuyvesant when Burgo-
master of New Amsterdam, and
when after his sleep of two hundred
years, or more, he wakes up in New
York city, still a burgomaster, but
somewhat out of date with his quaint
clothes and speech, were faithfully
portrayed to the delight of the large
audience. Harry Hermen in the title
role was the chief funmaker, and he
seemed more to the part of the quaint
and frolicsome old Dutchman. The
chorus is particularly good and the
whole performance is a genuine treat.
The Burgomaster will remain at the
Opera House for the rest of the week,
and those who enjoy a real good mus-
ical comedy should see it. St. John
only once in a decade gets anything
in this line at all approaching this
performance.

Nickel Attracting Thousands.

The Nickel has struck the popular
fancy again in offering a big list of
the best pictures money could pro-
cure, a dainty singing act by Pauline
Berry and Miss Grace Renard's dra-
matic talks upon the film subjects.
Miss Barry received a flattering re-
ception upon her return engagement

BLEED THE NEWSPAPERS.

The Federal Post Office Department
closed the year's business with a surplus
of \$1,982,301—the largest surplus on re-
cord, and quite a good slice of this is con-
tributed by the publishers of newspapers
who are not fortunate enough to print a
daily. There are in Canada about 1,500
newspapers and other periodicals. Prob-
ably 1,000 of these are published weekly
and putting the amount paid weekly at
\$2.00, which is a low estimate, the total
would be \$2,000 per week, or over \$100,-
000 per year. Surely, with such a sur-
plus as that given above, the Canadian
Government can afford to do without
this contribution from the weekly press
of Canada, which is very burdensome
and an injury to the publishing business.
