Target Tips and Hunting Helps
by Alfred P. Lane

A New Questions and Answers Department of Interest to Shooters

Readers are reminded that this column is open to questions which should be sent to me in care of the Sporting Editor, and to discussions by the readers on anything connected with hunting or target shooting.—A. P. L.

M. A. Cooperstown, N. D.

1. What is the velocity and penetration of the Savage compared with the Colt Automatic pistols in .32 calibre?

Ans. There is no difference. 2. How does the .32-20 Colt Revolver with 6 inch barrel compare in velocity and penetration with the .32 Automatic Colts?

Ans. The .32-20 has the greater power and penetration. A. E. C., Hartford, Conn.

1. Do you consider the Remington .22 Automatic cartridge as powerful as a .22 long rifle, also a .22-45?

Ans. The ballistics of the .22 Remington Autoloading are: Muzzle velocity 950 ft. seconds; muzzle energy 90 ft. lbs. .22 long rifle, muzzle velocity 983 ft. seconds; muzzle energy 86 ft. lbs. .22-45, muzzle velocity, 1110 ft. seconds; muzzle energy 123 ft. lbs.

2. How does it compare in range, penetration and accuracy with the above mentioned cartridges?

Ans. All three above mentioned are entirely satisfactory for small game shooting.

3. Do you consider it as good as all round cartridges for small game as compared with other .22's?

Ans. Personal preference should govern.

4. Why don't you take up the matter of the take-down system with the manufacturers?

L. H., Parrish Wis., Which will penetrate the deeper in wood at a distance of 440 yds., the new slide action Remington rifle using the .25 calibre cartridges, or the Savage using the .303 calibre cartridge, both using metal cased bullets?

Ans. The .25 Remington cartridge will penetrate further owing to its smaller calibre.

F. C. N., Rd Wing, Minn. 1. Are the Colt .22 Automatics already on the market?

Ans. Not that I know of.

2. Where can I get one of the Remington .22 calibre pistols manufactured a few years ago?

Ans. I do not know. They were discontinued some years ago, and you probably could not get one except from a dealer in second-hand firearms.

3. Is a Colt .22 calibre revolver affected the same way as a rifle or pistol from gas cutting on account of using .22 shorts extensively? Does it seriously affect the accuracy?

Ans. Yes, but the accuracy is not affected in as great degree as in a rifle.

4. I use .22 long rifle and shorts semi-smokeless loaded and sometimes the UMC Lesmok. Does rubbing oil the lubricant by carrying them in belt loops cause inaccuracy fine shots?

Ans. No.

3. Are not the .380 Auto cartridges and the .38 Auto cartridges the same in calibre with the difference only in the weight of bullet?

Ans. Yes, the difference is in the weight of bullet and the amount of powder.

4. What is the penetration and foot lbs. of hitting power of the .32 and the .380 auto pistols?

Ans. The .32 Auto pistol cartridge has a bullet weighing 74 grains, the muzzle velocity being 938 ft. per second, and a muzzle energy of 114 ft. lbs. The .380 Auto pistol cartridge has a bullet weighing 95 grains, muzzle velocity of 880 ft. per second, and a muzzle energy of 166 ft. lbs. From point of effectiveness, the .380 is much to be preferred owing to its greater diameter and energy.

Ans. Practically no difference. 2. What is the accurate range of Colt .32 Auto, Colt .380 Auto, Colt .38 Auto (pocket model), Savage .32 Auto, Savage .380 Auto, and Smith & Wesson .35 Auto.

Ans. The .32 Auto and the .380 Auto cartridges in either the Colt or the Savage pistols or the .35 auto in the Smith & Wesson pistol are accurate up to about 20 to 35 yards. The Colt regular .38 auto, which is a much more powerful cartridge than the others, is accurate up to 50 to 75

NOTICE is hereby given that application will be made to the Local Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick at its next Session for an Act to incorporate The North West Miramichi River Driving Company.

The purposes for which incorporation is sought are to conduct and carry on the driving of lumber on the North West Branch of the Miramichi River from the mouth of Portage River to the Johnston Bridge so-called above Red Bank, and on the Little South West Miramichi River from the mouth of Catamaran Brook to the upper or northerly side of a Bog on at the lower end of the Ox Bow Meadow; to build and maintain dams, booms, and other works and improvements in connection with such driving operations; to fix fees for driving such lumber and to make other provisions for the proper carrying out of the proposed undertaking.
