Halifax, March 16-Of the 4, 448,188 tons of the coal in Nova Scotia during the year ending Sent. 30, 1924, according to official figures just issued, the largest buyer was Nova Scitia, which took 1,782,413 tons; Quebec ' took 1,-570,733 tons, and Ontario 30. New Brunswick bought 529,872 tons and 209,230 tons went to New-foundland. United States took 5.706 tons, as compared with 278. tons the previous year, 308,754 in 1922 .European buyers ok 37,764 tons, a little more than half the previous year's sales were sold to vessels for bunker.

LUMBER CUT IN 1924 EXCEEDED THE ESTIMATES

The 1924 timber cut on Crown Land n New Brunswick was 362,363,895 superficial feet, exceeding the estimate by about twelve million superficial feet, ccording to the annual report of the Department of Lands and Mines, which was tabled in the Legislature.

Twenty-seven per cent. of this amount or 98,383 680 feet, consisted of fire-killed spruce, pine, cedar and fir, while 20 per ent of the total cut consisted of budworm-killed spruce and fir. The salvag of these two classes of defective timber at reduced stumpage rates thus amounted to 47.1 per cent., or almost half of the

In the report G., H. Prince, Acting Deputy Minister, states that it is doubt. ful if the season's cut for 1624-25 will, in view of the depression in the lumber market, amount to more than 65 per cent of that of 1923-24. 
