Reading Character by the Voice

By RUTH CAMERON.



It is remarkable to me that the voice as an index to the character has never received more attention. We have some character students who read character by the lines on the palm, others who judge by the shape of the head and others who claim to be able to tell us all about a man by his handwriting. Now it seems to me that if sufficient study were made of the voice, it would be found to be as accurate and significant an index to character as any of these.

Voices are tremendously interesting things as you will find if you stop to notice them. A voice reflects its owner's state of health, his education or lack of it, his monetary mood and his habitual personality, to a wonderful degree. If you were to shut your eyes and listen to a person's voice I think you would get quite as good a notion of the real person than if you stopped up your ears and judged from sight alone. Of course the blind are the only people who really appreciate the full significance of voices. I imagine they can judge a man's character quite as accurately as the phrenologist or the palmist although such judgment is second nature to them rather than any science.

It seems to me that similar voices run in families, even more than similar physiognomies. I think this is because the voice is more plastic and more easily affected by environment than the face. The similar

bringing up and the similar point of view which the several members of the family often acquire, mould the voices into similarity more than the faces.

I had this family voice similarity strongly brought home to me the other day when I called up a friend of mine on the telephone. I was so positive that the voice which answered was hers that I did not stop for any preliminary inquiries but greeted her at once by name. The party at the other end of the telephone laughed. "It's not Helen speaking," she said, "it's her mother. I'll call her." When my friend came to the telephone she greeted me by my sister's name. It seems that her mother had been equally positive that she recognized my voice as my sister's. Incidentally, it may be interesting to know that neither this girl and her mother, nor my sister and I are strikingly alike in appearance.

In no way can you tell whether a person is an optimist or a pessimist so quickly as by the voice. Almost all voices have a decided upward or downward slant by which the owner's inclination toward optimism or pessimism is instantly indicated. The upward voice matches the upward turned mouth corners, and vice versa.

Lack of education shows in the voice just as much as in what the voice says. There is a peculiar, rough quality in the voice of an entirely uneducated person which is an unmistakable sign of under-breeding. Try listening to voices. You will find it opens an interesting vista of thought and observation.

And while you are about it, don't forget to listen to your own.

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German Officers Retire.

Constantinople, January 8. — No fewer than 280 Turkish officers of the rank of General, Brigadier-General and Lieut.-Colonel were placed on the retired list to-day as a result of changes in the military administration introduced by the new German advisers of the Turkish Government who, it is stated, contemplate still further changes.

Trunk of Aviator's Body

Washed Ashore on the New Jersey Coast—Identified by Paper Vest that Was Worn by the Airman.

New York, January 5.—The waves yesterday washed to shore at Edgewater, Long Island, a man's trunk—armless, legless and headless. It was washing back and forth with the ebb and tide of the waves when an Italian laborer saw it. On October 13, 1913, Aviator Albert J. Jewel started to fly from Hempstead Plains, L. I., to partake in an aviation meet on Staten Island.

The man's trunk that the Italian laborer found pounding on the beach was all that is left of Jewel.

The police have declined so far to believe that a positive identification has been made.

But the body was Jewel's to the best belief of his uncle, William H. Carey; his widow, Mrs. Jewel, and G. H. Lapointe, a friend who knew him well. There was nothing on the trunk save one side of a woolen undershirt and a paper vest.

It is the paper vest that seems to identify the body almost beyond doubt, for it is the make that all aviators wear when they are flying where the temperature is below freezing.

Furthermore, the stitching very close together in the vest, quite corresponds to the one which Lapointe saw Jewel put on early in the morning of Oct. 13.

What happened to Jewel we never be known. But the terrible fact that his trunk floated at last to shore with neither arms nor legs nor head indicates clearly enough that there was a frightful accident to his machine before it fell or that man-eating sharks pounced upon him somewhere out in the Atlantic.

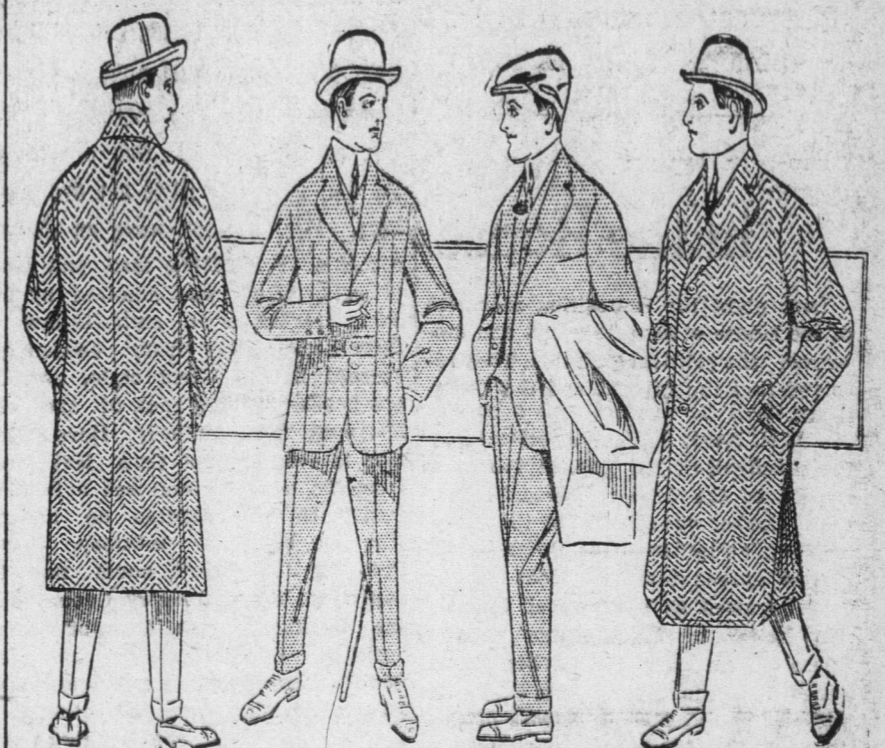
