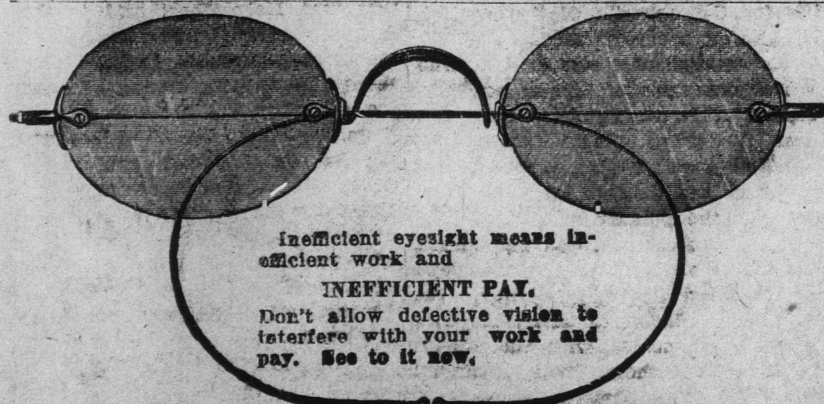

### Methodist Conference.

MONDAY, June 28.

Afternoon Session.—Session opened with usual devotional exercises. Minutes of previous session read and confirmed.

The Conference then received a deputation from the Lord's Day Alliance consisting of Canon Bolt, Rev. J. Sutherland and Mr. Stirling. Canon Bolt addressed the Conference upon the issue of the Lord's Day. War has made many changes, said the learned Canon, and many of our preconceived notions must change. No age or church has the entire truth, and while holding firm to principles we all make for contributions. Concerning the Lord's Day he said we do not observe the Jewish Sabbath but the day which our Lord honored when he rose from the dead, but the same principles govern us. Man needs a day for spiritual culture. He needs the day for physical rest and recuperation.

Rev. Mr. Sutherland said it is not in the outskirts chiefly but in the city that the Lord's Day is being desecrated. Something must be done. A Sabbath day of rest is essential to the welfare of a community.

Mr. Stirling in a few remarks supported the statement made by the other members of the deputation. The Conference then received a deputation from the W. C. T. U. consisting of the following ladies:—Mrs. Benedict, President; Mrs. Penman, Vice-President; Mrs. Pippy, Evangelistic Supt.; Mrs. Mitchell, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Milley, Treasurer; Mrs. Hunter, Mrs. Grimes, Mrs. Soper, Mrs. Vey, U. G. Secretary. The General Superintendent called upon Dr. Moore to answer the questions of the deputation.

The Conference then resumed order of business and several reports were presented and passed.

#### EVENING SESSION.

A large number gathered in the Conference Church to witness the setting aside for the Christian Ministry the following candidates: Geo. Mercer, who has completed his theological course at Wesleyan College, Montreal; Fred. G. Purchase, of Victoria University, Toronto; and A. Wilkinson, of Mount Allison University, Sackville.

The Rostrum was occupied by the following clergymen:—Dr. Chown, General Supt.; Rev. Chas. Howse, President of Conference; Dr. Curtis, Revs. F. R. Matthews, ex-President; J. R. Saint, T. B. Darby.

According to the well-honored custom the candidates were in turn called upon to give the story of their conversation and of the call to the Christian ministry. Geo. L. Mercer remembered distinctly when he gave himself to God. By the influence of a good home and relatives who were in the ministry he was led to consider the work of the ministry as a life vocation. After spending the usual probationary time on circuit he went to college and having passed the college examinations for the Methodist ministry he now offers himself to the Christian ministry.

John A. Wilkinson was led to God by those forces which were brought to bear upon his life.

(1) A godly mother. She gave him as an offering to the Lord; (2) A good home; (3) The Sunday School. He having proved the necessary requirements for the Christian ministry now offers himself to the Church willing to work in any place where she should place him.

John A. Wilkinson. It was always his privilege to live in a godly home under Christian influences. While in a missionary meeting he was led to consecrate himself to God. When opportunity offered he came as a candidate to the Newfoundland Conference. Having been accepted, he labored for three years on circuit and then proceeded to Mount Allison University from which college he now came with his certificate and unreservedly offers himself to the Methodist Church.

The congregation then sang "Lord of the Harvest Field," after which the President proceeded to read the solemn ritual for the ordaining of men to the Christian ministry. In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost the above men were solemnly set apart for the work of the ministry and were given copies of the Holy Scriptures together with authority to preach and administer the sacraments in the congregation of the people.

Dr. Chown delivered the charge. He felt like complimenting Methodist upon the type of young men she was receiving into her ranks as ministers. He also congratulated and in part exhorted the young men who were entering upon the ministry at a time of great crisis and movements in the religious world. The Doctor emphasized the importance of leading men to seek and see Jesus and to find him as a personal Saviour. He gave the following advice:—

(1) Learn to love study—study social conditions. Keep in touch with the thought and life of to-day. Endeavour to get verdicts from your people for the Lord Jesus. You are a fraud unless you can secure your verdict, do business for God, save souls;

(2) Be in love with your work. Be alert and active in every part of your being. In this day a Minister must love his work and use all his energy in the service of the Master.

The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the Doxology and National Anthem. Dr. Chown delivering the Benediction.

#### TUESDAY, June 29.

Morning Session.—9:30-10 were taken up with Committees. Conference assembled at 10 o'clock. After the usual devotional exercises the minutes of previous session were read and confirmed.

The time of the Morning Session was taken up with routine work. Reports from the Missionary, Examining Committees were presented and passed. The Conference then received the Report of the Laymen Association. Dr. Bland addressed the Conference at the noon hour as usual.

### Laying the Foundation Stone.

At 3 p.m. this afternoon, the Rev. Dr. Chown, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Moore, lays the foundation stone of the new Cochrane Street Church. The foundation stone of the church which was destroyed by fire on January 18th, 1914, was laid by the late Rev. Job Shenston. Among those who signed the roll in September, 1889 are the following who survive to-day: Hon. James Angel, Hon. H. J. B. Woods, J. E. P. Peters, Esq., and Wm. J. Herder, Esq. This roll, together with the coins and other records of that day will be placed in the new foundation stone with the records and newspapers of to-day.

### SEE AMERICA FIRST—THE UPPER MISSISSIPPI

The American traveller who has grown tired of throttling dollars as they rush by and who does not care to trust himself to an ocean liner infested by submarines and sea-sickness, can do no better than to install himself upon the loading deck of a Mississippi River steamer if he can find one, and go to St. Paul.

This is not an exciting trip and cannot be described with bated breath to crowds of eager listeners many years afterwards. But as a toner down of jangled nerves and a sedative for runaway ambition, as well as a cure for bored eyes, it cannot be equalled. The Mississippi approaches St. Paul from St. Louis by flowing north, south, east and west with great industry, thus forming a series of loops, curves, convolutions and contortions, lined on both sides with scenery which would cost a large fortune to duplicate. Great bluffs rear their precipitous forms athwart the landscape, on every hand, apparently trying to surround the steamer with 700-foot fortifications. But just as the nervous passenger is about to signal for an aeroplane, the river slips around a corner and fifteen new reels of superior views are unrolled before him, causing him to miss his dinner while watching the channel contort between the headlands.

The government has taken the Upper Mississippi firmly in hand and has compelled it to flow in an orderly manner, for 500 miles between wing dams and other engineering corsets. This provides plenty of water to float on but not enough to leap up into the hurricane deck and flow down the chimneys in case of trouble.

Beautiful and picturesque towns dot the upper rivers, and the citizen who is fond of foreign travel can step off at any place, and secure the thrill of the same by asking the honest Norwegian bystander a question and getting two quarts of superfluous "Ja" by way of an answer.
