## British Miners Resume Work on Monday

### Industries Set-back two Months by Strike-- Two Supporters Desert Lloyd George--Bolsheviks Using Chinese Troops--Harding Declares League of Nations Defunct--Trotzky Aiming for World Revolution.

#### FULL WORK IN MINES ON MONDAY.

LONDON, Nov. 4. Full work is expected to be resumed in the coal mines closed down by the recent miners' strike on Monday, when the railways are also expected to institute normal service. Restrictions on lighting in force since the beginning of the strike, probably will be removed to-night, but limitations on supply of household coal probably will be continued for the next two weeks. Reports from the coal fields to-day concerning the men's quick return to work are optimistic, but many mines cannot start fully till Monday. It is anticipated that it will take two months for all industries affected by the tie-up to get back to normal again.

#### DEFLECTIONS FROM BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

the Opposition side of the House of Commons. Lord Henry's family has high conservative traditions. He was returned at the general election as a Tory-Democrat-Coalitionist, but has always shown an independence of party whips. With the Cecil family he has expressed indignation against the Government concerning the alleged Irish reprisals, as was indicated the other evening when high words passed between him and Sir Hamar Greenwood, Irish Secretary, when they encountered each other in the lobby of the Commons. This explosion in its personal aspect evaporated in a few minutes. Oswald Mosley also accompanies Lord Henry to the other side of the House on the same grounds.

#### PLANS FOR COUNTER REVOLUTION DISCOVERED.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 4. The Berlingske Tidendes Kovno correspondent says to-day that Moscow newspapers received in Kovno, record an official announcement of a discovery by Soviets of plans for a big counter revolution. Precautions have been taken and thousands of persons are being arrested daily, the newspapers say, and the General Staff has detained three thousand of the former Czar's officers, who have been interned in Orenburg. According to the Moscow Pravda, as quoted by a correspondent, Leon Trotzky, Bolshevik Minister of War and Marine, in a speech in Petrograd declared, "I know danger is coming. I realize the possibility of a severe winter, but though three-fourths die of hunger and cold, the remainder will survive to carry to victory the world revolution."

#### WRANGEL'S POSITION.

PARIS, Nov. 4. Despatches received in official circles here to-day indicated that General Wrangel is likely to be obliged to retreat well into the interior of the Crimea. The Soviet troops are declared to have been strongly reinforced by Chinese. They have about

one hundred thousand men pressing in upon Salkovo and Perokop, the last named place already having been surrounded.

#### LATEST RETURNS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. An almost record smashing electoral vote for Senator Harding, topping the four hundred mark and Republican majorities of more than a score in the Senate and 150 in the House were assured from virtually complete returns to-night from Tuesday's elections. With Democratic strong holds of Oklahoma, Missouri, and Tennessee definitely swept into the Republican party's ranks by crushing victory, the Harding-Coolidge ticket had 396 votes exclusive of five from Montana, where the Republican state ticket was victorious and the Presidential ticket ahead. The Republican landslide to-night had given the Republicans fifty-eight Senate seats, as against thirty-seven for the Democrats, with late returns undermining the seat of Senator Breckinridge, Democrat, Kentucky. His Republican opponent, Richard J. Ernst, forged ahead in a nip and tuck fight for the only Senate fight left unsettled. Of 36 Senate contests, Republicans captured 9 from the Democrats and elected all 15 of their candidates.

#### HARDING'S MAJORITY IN MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, Nov. 4. Complete returns in Massachusetts show that Harding's plurality in the State was four hundred thousand. Final reports made no change in enormous pluralities accorded the Republican candidate for State offices.

#### "NOW DECEASED."

MARLON, Ohio, Nov. 4. Making his first speech as President-elect, Warren Harding declared at an election celebration of home folks here to-night that the Versailles League of Nations was "now deceased," although the new administration intended to see that the nation played its part in a new International Association, founded on peace and justice.

#### FIRST GERMAN SHIP IN NEW YORK SINCE WAR.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. The first merchant steamship flying the German flag to come to the port of New York since July, 1914, arrived here to-day. The vessel, which marks the resumption of trade with Germany under the flag of that country, was the Sophie Rickmers, built in Germany during the war. She is flying the old German merchant marine flag.

#### TIRED OF ONE MAN RULE.

LONDON, Nov. 4. Leading British Provincial newspapers consider the election of Sen-

ator Harding to the Presidency as an indication that the electorate is tired of what the Journal's call "One Man Rule."

#### APPLY FOR MEMBERSHIP IN LEAGUE.

PARIS, Nov. 4. Application for membership in the League of Nations will be made at the meeting of the League in Geneva this month on behalf of not only Germany, but of Austria, according to information here. Bulgaria, it is learned, will also make application.

#### NEW LICENSING BILL NEXT WEEK.

LONDON, Nov. 4. Premier Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons to-day that he had not yet decided whether he would attend the League of Nations conference in Geneva. He announced that a new Licensing Bill would be introduced next week.

#### NO HITCH IN MERGER PLANS.

TORONTO, Nov. 4. A financier in close touch with the merger plans of the British Empire Steel Corporation, is quoted as saying that no hitch has occurred in the plans and that arrangements are proceeding as rapidly as possible. Matters are now in the hands of lawyers of whom about ten are working on the merger. The laws and regulations of several different Canadian provinces have to be reconciled, and along with that are legal conditions in England from which some of the capital will be derived.

#### SOVING HOUSING PROBLEM.

LONDON, Nov. 4. The House of Commons to-day took the second reading of a Bill empowering local authorities to hire empty houses compulsory.

#### STILL KING OF PRUSSIA!


LONDON, Nov. 4. More than sixty-two million Dutch florins have been paid to former Emperor William of Germany as King of Prussia by the Prussian Government since he fled to Holland, according to an official statement made to the legal committee of the Prussian Assembly on Wednesday, says a London Times despatch from Berlin.

### Civic Commission.

#### WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Commission was held last night. Chairman Gosling and Commissioners Mullaly, Morris, Ayre, Vinnicombe, Devine and Peet being present. Minutes of last meeting being confirmed, the following matters were disposed of:

A communication was read from Dale & Dale, Ltd., offering proportion of tax for new Accident Company, business for balance of year. Same was accepted.

C. Tessier asked refund of Motor Tax paid early in the season, stating the car was shipped to England the latter part of July. The Commission has no right to refund the tax.

H. R. Tessier asked that attention be given Palk's Hill, Topsail Road, same being in dangerous condition. This matter was referred to the engineer.

A communication was read from Harvey & Co., Ltd., regarding the repairing of retaining wall at Shea & Co's premises.

The Secretary Great War Veteran's Association asked rebate account City Taxes Commission is unable to accede to request.

A protest was received from M. Darcy re erection for laundry purposes adjoining his premises, New Gower Street, for which he stated no permit had been given. The Engineer was instructed to visit the place and report.

Secretary Government Railway Commission Hall asked that the Commission reconsider its decision regarding proposed temporary erection east of Railway Station. This matter was referred to the City Solicitor.

Reconsideration of the decision of last meeting regarding Mr. Maddigan's request to build annex corner Water and Leslie Streets was taken up. It was decided permission to build be given on the condition that same is

erected to conform to the new street line.

Plans approved: Boiler house for A. H. Murray, Beck's Cove; new annex to General Post Office, west side.

Plans submitted by Francis Power to build one storey addition, corner Barter's Hill and New Gower Street, were deferred, pending report of the solicitor.

Ordered shed east of General Post Office be removed.

Parties obstructing sidewalk Waldegrave Street, are to be notified to remove the cause of complaint, failing which they will be prosecuted.

Engineer is to make survey of properties corner Rennie's Mill Road and Circular Road, also corner Circular and Monkstown Roads, with a view to expropriation of a portion of the lands.

The reports of the City Engineer, Plumbing Inspector and City Health officer were read, and with the passing of pay rolls and bills the meeting adjourned at 11.15.
