Heidelberg - (Assaciated Press) -Sword duelling in the University o Heidelberg is as popular and as non to-day as it was more than 500 years ago, when this oldest of German schools were founded. Vicually every student who has passed the first year wears a sword scar on the left side of his chin or the left. cheek, or a bandaged head which advertises that the scar is in the mak-

Duels do not always arise from anger or quarrels, but out of the necessity of providing the student with the diploma of sword prowess, or to give him sword practice which affords the students great delight.
