# Municipal

Numbers of city patrons of the Telegram who are also voters in civic elections have recently requested that we state in this column, the exact and specific qualifications required to be possessed by any person soliciting Municipal honors. We take extreme pleasure in doing so, and without elaboration shall, to-day, quote from both the St. John's Municipal Act of 1921, and the Election Act of 1913. Section 20 of the former provides, that any person shall Mayor or Councillor, who

- (a) is qualified under the Acts in to be elected a member of the House of Assembly:
- (b) has resided in the city (St John's) for at least one year immediately preceding nomination; and (c) is qualified to vote under Sec tion 8 or Section 10 of this

Returning to the first qualification as defined by the St. John's Municipal Act. Section 50 of the Newfoundland Electine Casino beginning Monday night. tion Act of 1913, declares as

follows: "The qualification of persons to be elected to serve as members of the House of Assembly shall be a net annual income, arising from any source whatever, of four hundred and eighty dollars, (\$480.00) or the possession of property: exceeding two thousand four hundred dellars, (\$2,400.00) clear of all encumbrances; and the length of the period of residence within the said island shall be two years next pre ceding such election; and every candidate for such election shall be a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years (this puts female candidates out of the running for either Mayor or Councillor not because of years, be it understood, but it is specifcally declared that such candidates must be males) of sound understanding and never having been convicted in courts of law of any infamous crime."

Sections 8 and 10 of the St. John's Municipal Act, which provides for electoral qualifications of civic voters, reads thusly:

Every such person and body corporate shall be deemed to be, and is, hereafter described as a ratepayer.
