We hope the Government will come to their aid, and be ready to buy the output of the mills once they start work again. Whitbourne has felt the pinch of hard times; also, and has few resources than a place on the coast would have.

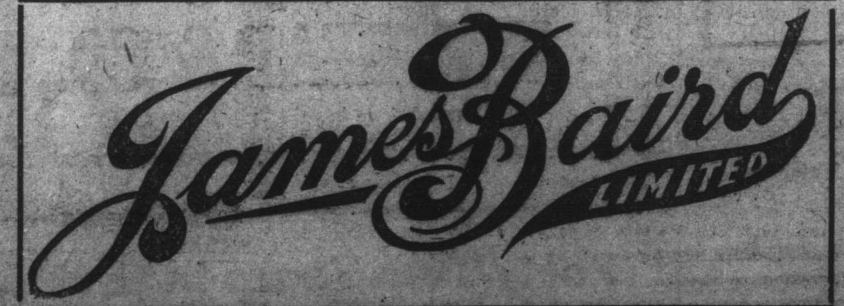

Obituary.

MICHAEL F. MURPHY.

The numerous friends and acquaintances of Mr. M. F. Murphy, Master Cooper and Wharfman at R. G. Rendell's, were shocked to hear of his sudden death at his late residence Thursday evening last. Deceased who was a prominent citizen and well beloved by all who knew him, had a very extensive acquaintance, not only in the city, but also in the outports among the fishermen and planters, owing to his association with defunct firms of Walter Grieve & Co., Sir Robert Thorburn and later R. G. Rendell & Co. He put three generations of fishermen dealers through his hands in these firms, and was well and favorably known by all the planters. When a mere boy he entered the employ of Walter Grieve & Co., on the South Side where his father, the late Mr. Sylvie Murphy, was Master Cooper and Room Manager. After his father's death he succeeded him in his work and when Walter Grieve & Co. went out of business, he accepted a position in the same capacity with Sir Robert Thorburn who had the highest opinion of his ability and integrity, and remained his steadfast friend up to the time of his (Sir Robert's) death. When Mr. R. G. Rendell took over C. F. Bennett's premises, knowing Mr. Murphy's value he made it a point to secure his services and he was contented in his employ as wharf superintendent up to the time of his death. Mr. Murphy's genial and obliging manner endeared him to all who had dealings with these firms. He was a genuine friend and sympathizer with the outport fishermen, and the news of his death will be learned by them with corresponding regret. Mr. Murphy was a life-long member of the Benevolent Irish Society, the flag of which is flying at half mast to-day in sympathy with the death of a zealous and consistent member of that body. He occupied the position of a member of the School Board of St. Patrick's Hall for the past twenty-five years, and was consistently zealous in the cause of education. Mr. Murphy, in the eighties, married Miss Halley, daughter of the late Mr. Halley of Bell Street and had a family of one son and two daughters. His son Sylvie died about two years ago. One daughter Catherine, is married to Mr. John J. Sage, at T. & M. Winter's office, the other, Nellie, is the wife of Mr. C. G. Cambert, painter. He is also survived by several grandchildren. To them as well as his widow who is heart broken over the suddenness of this great bereavement, the Telegram extends its sympathy. The funeral will take place to-morrow to the Cathedral and Beldere Cemetery from 33 Monkstown Road. One of the links of sincere neighborly friendship (now getting rare) that connected the old St. John's with the new has been severed in the death of M. F. Murphy. May his soul rest in peace—Com.
