Inter-Imperial**Organization.****FOR MARKETING OF WHEAT CROP.**

(Special Cable to The Mail and Em-
pire.)

London.—Mr. Trethowan, chairman
of the farmers' pool of New South
Wales, Australia, will shortly visit
Canada and United States to arrange
an understanding for the marketing
of the Australian, Canadian and Am-
erican wheat crops in a manner
which will stabilize the market and
secure the best possible prices to the
producers. This announcement is the
latest development in the reported
possibility of a corner in the world's
wheat supply, although Mr. Tretho-
wan, according to the Morning Post,
denies that his visit to Canada means
states that he will visit Canada in his
the furthering of such a design. He
capacity as President of the Federal
Farmers' Association, an Australian
organization, which advocates the
placing of wheat on the market only
as it is required, thus conserving the
interests of both the consumer and
the producer. It is planned to com-
plete such a wheat marketing or-
ganization in Australia and then ap-
ply similar machinery to wheat pro-
duction and selling in North America.
The proposal involves the forming of
a central committee in London to act
as the executive of all the parties in
the pool.

It is understood that the propo-
sition which Mr. Trethowan will make
to the representatives of the Canadian
wheat growing and marketing or-
ganizations is that selling periods for
the respective crops be so defined as
to avoid competition.

The growth of the co-operative
movement throughout the Empire,
which the correspondent has pointed
out in previous despatches, makes
world control of the marketing of
wheat a distinct possibility. Now that
Russia is for the time being eliminat-
ed as a wheat exporting country, In-
dia, Australia and Canada could easily
make an inter-Imperial arrangement
for non-competitive selling. Add the
United States to this combination and
Argentina would be left as the only
important competitor in the world mar-
kets.

Tuberculosis and Heredity.

Until comparatively recent years it
was one of the shibboleths of the
medical profession that tuberculosis
is a hereditary disease and laymen, in
duty bound to accept the teachings of
the learned in matters of special
knowledge, have accepted the dictum.
Social workers in numbers have tal-
ked of the crime of allowing a tuber-
culous person to marry and some of the
sages of eugenics have urged the pas-
sage of legislation to prohibit such
alliances.

But along comes Dr. Marcus Paterson,
one of the greatest living authori-
ties on tuberculosis, to give a last blow
to the theory, and he quotes facts and
figures in convincing array to prove
his point. Nor is he evidently alone
in his statement for such recognized
world experts as von Pirquet, Speck,
Faludi and Karl Pearson, after test-
ing thousands of cases, are quoted to
buttress up his statement.

There is not the slightest doubt, say
these scientists in chorus, that tuber-
culous parents raise children, this is
a matter of common experience. There
is, fortunately, plenty of evidence to
show that it is far more probable that
the children of tuberculous parents re-
ceive infection after rather than be-
fore birth.

Professor von Pirquet made tuber-
culin tests on hundreds of infants and
not a single one under the age of three
months gave a positive reaction, pro-
ving that they were absolutely free
from infection. Yet after three months
the percentage rapidly increased until
at the age of six years, nearly half
the children of infected parents gave
evidence of the disease. The un-
healthy environment in which the
children of tuberculous patients are of-
ten forced to live is probably the cause.

The Late Sir John Eaton.**OF TORONTO, ONTARIO.**

The following biographical sketch
of Sir John Eaton of Toronto, who died
at his home in that city last night at
the age of 46, has been compiled by the
Canadian Press Service.

Sir John Craig Eaton, K.B., gen-
erally supposed to be Toronto's wealth-
iest citizen, was born in Toronto on
April 28, 1876. His father was the late
Timothy Eaton, founder of the exten-
sive business with important inter-
ests in a number of cities of the Do-
minion including Montreal, Moncton,
Winnipeg, Vancouver and Toronto.

Educated in the public schools of
Toronto and at Upper Canada College,
John C. Eaton was trained to the busi-
ness which his father had begun. Upon
the father's death in 1907, the son,
who was then Vice-President of the T.
Eaton Company. The business contin-
ued to expand until the Eaton inter-
ests virtually touched every impor-
tant point in Canada and reached far
beyond the Dominion. Sir John's other
business activities embraced several
directorships. He was on the Boards
of the Canadian Pacific Railway, The
Sterling Bank and the Dominion Bank,
and he held governorships in Victoria
University and the Toronto General
Hospital.

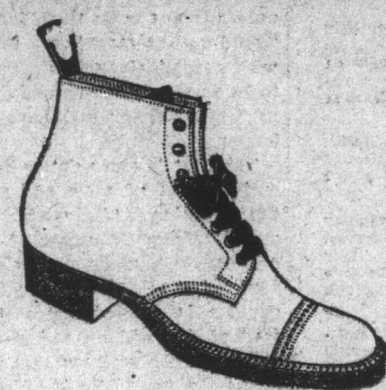
Sir John Eaton was one of Toronto's
