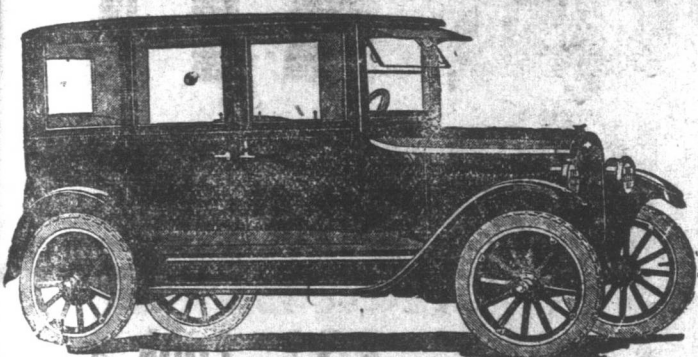

### Epworth League at Carbonear

By request, on this Monday night,  
in the College Hall, we had the priv-  
ilege of introducing a series of pa-  
pers or talks (for the writer doesn't  
use papers) on the Introduction, na-  
ture and growth, of Methodism in  
Newfoundland, Canada, and the world.  
Interpreted with music by Miss  
Dudman Joyce, and singing by the  
gathering, with a solo finely rendered  
by Miss B. Reid, and a recitation by  
Mrs. Leonard Taylor, and Scripture  
by Miss Lizzie Penny, the writer took  
Charles Wesley's Hymns as a kind of  
window through which the nature, ori-  
gin, and growth of Methodism, could  
be seen to advantage, as clearly, per-  
haps, as in any other way. The birth  
of religion in the soul, the growth in  
Christian Character, with its very  
chequered, experiences, family devo-  
tion, the preaching by men whose lips  
were touched, and hearts inflamed  
with Celestial fire, beginning with the  
Wesleys, in May, 1738; and soon  
spreading over three continents, the  
struggles and triumphs of life and  
death of untold numbers, could be  
seen through those marvellously in-  
spired hymns, of which there were  
some 6,000 by that born poet Charles  
Wesley than whom none greater or  
more worthy has yet appeared on  
earth—either in the workman or his  
work.

After reflecting somewhat on the  
peculiar memory of the speaker, the  
President of the League, Mr. Rich-  
ards, and Rev. J. L. Newman, as well,  
spoke very touchingly, and most ap-  
propriately on the old Hymns that  
among the elder Methodists, on Sal-  
vation or Hell, and the future State,  
were so often sung, and, as represent-  
ing the truth according to their face  
value in the Book, as they understood  
them, were, by the most, strongly be-  
lieved in.

But now, they are being reminded  
that they, our fathers, were largely  
"in fear, where no fear was." The  
tyrant Dionysius kept a sword sus-  
pended by a thin hair immediately  
over the head of Damiocles, where he  
sat at the feast, and so the danger of  
Hell is a warning to be ready for exit  
at any moment. And so, Wesley:—

"At point of time, a moment's space,  
Removes me to that heavenly place,  
Or shuts me up in Hell."

In modern thought, and perhaps, in  
a way, the old Medieval conception of  
punishment, has no real existence,  
nor do we think that the thoughts of  
hell create so much fear, or wishes  
for heaven have so much influence in  
the matter of behavior, and godliness,  
as many critics think. The awful as-  
sertations of the great Teacher,  
apart from those of the Apostles, the  
reiterated warnings of "the worm that  
never dies," the "fire that is not  
quenched," the question he asks of  
the serpents and generations of vip-  
ers; how they could escape "the dam-  
nation of hell," may be figures, but  
they are terrible suggestions of some-  
thing behind, or in them.

### SUGGESTIONS FROM GEORGE ST. JUBILEE.

Some 132 years ago John McGear  
arrived at Carbonear, and some 158  
years ago Lawrence Coughlan came  
to Hr. Grace, as Missionary Repre-  
sentatives from British Methodism.  
And so George St. is, or should be, a  
50 years' representative of the very  
same thing. The awful and bloody  
revolutions in France, its worship of  
the goddess Reason. Its abolishing the  
Sabbath, and its criminals filling the  
gaols to their utmost capacity, would  
have found probably a second chap-  
ter of the same thing in England, but  
for one thing—Methodism born in two  
times—The Delam that left God out,  
as it were, from his world, that re-  
fected revelation and trifled with it,  
soon began to ridicule religion, and  
naturally enough was developing  
Atheism, in which drinking, hunting,  
swearing, and other very com-  
mon, but a common disgrace—Meth-

odism, as it was then, with its pecu-  
liar doctrine and principles, was a  
great factor of salvation, nor do we  
think it ever did, or ever will, pro-  
duce, or lead to the development of an  
Omar Khayyam:—

"Some Folks of a surly Tanster tell,  
And dash his visage with the  
smoke of Hell:  
They talk of some strict Testin' of  
us—Plah!  
He's a Good Fellow, and 'twill all  
be well."

"Myself am Hell." Yes, and a bad  
Hell it must be. The rich man was  
suffering from some inward complaint  
and couldn't get it relieved, he want-  
ed something he couldn't get, and  
probably is wanting yet.

Between venal sin, and mortal sin,  
so called, there may be a considerable  
margin, but they are both bad, and  
need an atonement—penitent, or pen-  
al. Yet within a very small radius  
of that very House of God, was the  
Red Light District, with its bootless,  
its uncleanness, and, perhaps, worse  
than all, that abomination of modern  
Society—the divorce court! It may  
seem a bold statement, but as a mat-  
ter of fact Hell is inseparable from  
the very constitution and condition  
of things. The creation of man, free  
to do good or ill, anticipated, and pre-  
pared for it. The perturbation of the  
Planet Uranus is caused by the Planet  
Neptune, some 400 millions of miles  
away, in the comparative darkness  
and confines of the Polar Seas, there  
is a cause and effect, unalterable,  
while nature and gravitation endure.  
The cross, where, on Calvary, the man  
of sorrow trembled, and wept, and  
bled, is the effect of man, and this  
world of sin is the cause. The doc-  
trine of endless punishment, is not,  
with us, a mere dogma; it belongs to  
a great scheme of revealed truth,  
which, we call the plan of redemption,  
all of which stand or fall together.

Hell proper is a benevolent arrange-  
ment. It is the common sewer of  
all that is abominable, and abandon-  
ed, and reckless as to principle, and  
depraved as to morals; the one com-  
mon eddy, where everything that is  
polluted and wretched and filthy, is  
gathered together, Matthew 13, 41-43.

The Son of Man shall send forth his  
Angels, and they shall gather out of  
his Kingdom all things (scandals) that  
offend, and them which do injury;  
and shall cast them into a furnace of  
fire; there shall be wailing and gnash-  
ing of teeth." If we understand the  
duty of the Church, it is to descend  
into the present Hell of men's sins,  
so that by all means it may save some  
or, as St. Jude says: "pulling them  
out of the fire." It is only by Christ  
coming into man's heart, into contact  
with the world's sins, can Hell in its  
evil sense possibly cease to exist, here  
and now and never, Corinthians 2,  
6-2. "Now is the accepted time; be-  
hold, now is the day of Salvation,  
through Jesus who delivers us "from  
the wrath to come." F. G. W.

MR. GEORGE WALSH.

Mr. Herbert Walsh, Barber, of this  
City, received a night letter last evening  
from Somerville, Mass., stating  
that his father had died from the ef-  
fects of an accident he received on  
Saturday night last. Mr. George  
Walsh was a printer by trade, and  
first entered the printing business of  
the late John Thomas Burton at the  
Weekly Telegraph, in the year 1870,  
but finished his apprenticeship at the  
Courier, in the same office with the  
late Proprietor of the Eve Telegram.  
Afterwards he went to Montreal, but  
he again returned to his native land,  
and when the Telegram started busi-  
ness, he worked as a journeyman  
with the late Mr. Herder, and other  
printing offices in this city. Later he

of his wife he left for Boston and ob-  
tained work with the Forbes Print-  
ing and Lithograph Co., at Revere.

was about 68 years old. He leaves
