THRILLS IN THE TOWER OF

Our famous Tower of London is really a group of towers. Some are commonly shown to visitors and some are not. Four of them to which there has hitherto been no admission, except on business, are to be thrown open to the public this month: the Martin Tower, the Byward Tower, the Salt Tower, and the Broad Arrow Tower. What will our guides tell us

In some cases they will have to explain the names. The Byward Tower is really the Password Tower, because those who came that way were challenged by sentries. The small vaulted chamber on the right is supposed once to have been an oratory, but subsequently came to be known as the Warders' Parlour, because the Warders of the Tower-who must not be confused with the Youmen of the Guard-sat there. The Tower itself has a port-
