Lownow, Feb. 19.—The London Times, in an article on the Advama treaty, says: The want of definite basis of ar-bitration will reconcile England to the rejection of the Convention by the Uni-ted States. This point should be kept clearly in view in the event of offers for further negotiations. England now awaits proposals from America. The Times continues : "We have done our best. We have gone to the verge of mational humiliation to secure a settle-ment of the question at issue. We shall now wait for propositions from the new administration under Gen. Grant. It is admitted that the claims are a fair sub-ject for friendly arbitration."

New Orleans, 20th. — The trouble brewing between the Cuban refugees and Spanish residents in this city has occasioned a communication from the Spanish Consul to the Governor, asking for Governmental interference.

It does not much matter, as it seems to us, what the competition is call-ed—whether it is a "race" or a "trial of speed"--and we had always supposed before that the terms were synonymous. It is certain, any way, that they are do-ing their best, the one to beat the other in their passage across. If this had not been arranged beforehand, why did the City of Paris clear out three or four days before her advertised day of sailing, followed by the Russia within an hour? The Inma line officials are quite certain that their boat (the City of Paris) will win.
