The Ashantees are in full retreat; their main columm, however, is within easy march of the British advance, yet the General is unable to evertake and attack them, owing to the tardiness and cowardice of his native allies. He complains of the humiliating position in which he is placed in conse quence of being obliged to depend on such help.

RAMENS' ASSOCIATION FORMED. An important meeting was held on Monday afternoon last, commencing at 3 o'clock, in the school house of Section No. 2. About forty persons were pres-cut, comprising some of the largest and most influential farmers of the township. The feeling of the meeting was unari-mous and enthusiastic. Mr. Huch Rob-erts acted as chairmun and Mr. Marshall as Secretary. Moved by Mr. Alex. Burnett, seconded by Mr. Geo. Swan:--That it is desirable to form ourselves into an Association for the purpose of advancing the welfare of the farming community, and for our pro-tection against the imposition of taration contrary to our wishes and interest, and to oppose all attempts to break up our municipal institutions; be it therefore resolved that we now form ourselves into an Association under the name of "the Piklington Farmers' Association to con-sist of the ratepayers of the township, and to choose from their number a presi-dent, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and a committee of twelve, whose duty it shall be to carry into effect the resolu-tions of this Association at its regular meetings, and all other business connect-ed with this Association at its regular meetings, and all other business purpose as this, and to lay such corres-pondenge before this Association at its regular meetings.--Carried.
