BATHING A PHYSICAL VIRTUE

With the facilities this country is blessed with for bathing, there is no reason why we, as a people, should not be the purest on the face of the earth. The virtue and necessity of cleanliness is within the reach of all, and there is no excuse for any form of filth in this fair country.

In France and England few beautiful women can stand the test of a close examination. The opportunities and facilities for real baths are so limited that few houses and apartments contain bath tubs.

There are American students in Paris who are obliged to arrange a special hour for their bath once a week, and then go quite a distance to take it. But here in Canada we have the advantage of our modern conveniences. Our bath rooms are more popular than dining or drawing rooms.

We know and understand the effect of baths. We know their soothing effect upon the nerves and upon the system generally. Women write and ask me if too many baths are dangerous. I would say that there can be no possible danger from too much cleanliness. They must be careful to take their baths at the proper hours and use the proper temperature. Some take cold baths at night, which is a mistake.

The whole person should, preferably, be bathed in the morning with warm water. Soap should be used, together with a flesh brush or rubber sponge. Afterwards a moderate glow should be produced by a vigorous rubbing with a Turkish towel.

Good Housekeeping

(By Jane Edgington.)

BREAKFAST DISHES

Many of our ocean travelers are alarmed for their health. Tired business men cross for the sake of the restful trip. For such the time outside of meal hours sometimes hangs heavily, therefore they not only celebrate the eating times by a soak visit to the dining room, with resort to the smoking room for both liquid and solid refreshment, but they talk much of what they want or do not want to eat, and they also congratulate themselves because of that satisfied feeling which both men and beasts have after a good repast.

"I have had a good breakfast, and I feel good," is one of the common ways of expressing this satisfaction. For breakfast on our boat they may have fruit, cereals, a wide choice of fish and meats, eggs, coffee, toast, and coffee, pancakes, marmalade, and since we are on a German boat cold meats.

At this moment of writing I hear two men outside the writing room window on the upper promenade deck remarking on the advantages of ocean travel, and they are placing chief emphasis on "something to eat." I can hardly hear the other points of credit, but of this I am sure and the world eats with you and is satisfied with itself and you.

The chief variations on our breakfast card are to be found under "new laid eggs." Our fried eggs, omelets, poached eggs and scrambled eggs become different words after them each day, more to show that our chef knows all countries, some history and literature, and a good deal about different combinations of foods.

CAREFUL DOCTOR

It takes considerable courage for a doctor to deliberately prescribe only food for a despairing patient. Instead of resorting to the usual list of medicines. There are some truly scientific physicians among the present generation who recognize and treat conditions as they are and should be treated, regardless of the value to their pockets. Here's an instance:

"Four years ago I was taken with severe gastritis and nothing would stay on my stomach, so that I was on the verge of starvation."

"I heard of a doctor who had a summer cottage near me—a specialist from N. Y.—and as a last hope, sent for him."

Put butter in the pan, then the apples, and cook them a little first, then pour in the batter, made as above, and cook. Bacon may be served in the same way; but in that case no butter is needed.

This truly domestic German woman said of making noodles that no water must be used because they did not dry. Her receipt was as follows:

Noodles—Use no salt and no water. Work flour into egg until it will not stick. Then use the hands and bind around and around the section, making a great curl, until the seeds are reached; then cut off the curl. Roll up and cut curl across in thin slices, which will unroll and be the shoestring. Excellent for any cucumber salad.

CREAMED POTATOES—Bake the potatoes, and when they are cold peel and cut them up in little cubes. Put these into a cup of pure cream and heat up.

SHOESTRING CUCUMBERS—Cut cucumbers into two-inch sections after paring them. With a thin knife cut around and around the section, making a great curl, until the seeds are reached; then cut off the curl. Roll up and cut curl across in thin slices, which will unroll and be the shoestring. Excellent for any cucumber salad.
